The mouthpiece of the Woodstock Conservatives—i.e. The Press—announces in its editorial columns that Messrs. B. F. Smith, G. E. Balmain, and J. N. W. Winslow went to Ottawa to have Postmaster C. L. Smith and other Civil Service Officials dismissed. We hadn't a doubt as to the object of that visit but the Press took umbrage at our premature mention of the facts of the case. Will the Press be good enough to set our minds at rest on a few minor points in the affair? If one of the above mentioned gentleman had NOT gone to Ottawa would the new appointments been as they now are? If the true leader, or in other words the brains of the local Conservative machine, had gone too, would his proteges have done better than he did? There are other questions we might ask but we do not wish to seem inquisitive.

The appointment of J. N. W. Winslow would be a popular one had he obtained it by fair means. Postmaster Smith has been dismissed without a charge or an investigation and the Press says his crime is offensive partisanship. One might suppose that the same charge could be laid against his successor by the public whose chief interest in a postmaster is that he shall render it the service to which it is entitled. Mr. Smith has been as good a postmaster as Mr. Winslow will be and there is no just cause for his dismissal.

Premier Fleming will no doubt take unto himself the credit of the Valley Road and will use the same as a canvass with the people. To Dr.

Pugsley and F. B. Carvell belong the credit of the Valley Road. Had they been able to obtain a fair deal with Mr. Hazen's Government the road would have been under construction long ago. But Mr. Hazen and Mr. Fleming took a chance and things worked their way. Now Mr. Fleming is carrying out the plans of the Liberal Government and the people can thank Mr. Carvell and not Mr. Fleming if they get a good road and a good service.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier may be down but he is far from being out. As leader of the Opposition his wonderful powers of statesmanship are shown in a marked degree. In every speech which he has made since his scoring of the speaker on Wednesday last he has plainly shown his intentions. The new Prime Minister and his Cabinet will have no easy time with Sir Wilfrid and his efficient backers to keep up a continuous hammering. Already some of the Hon. gentlemen have been made to sit uneasily in their new seats and will undoubtedly experience many more uncomfortable moments. Sir Wilfrid knows well that the new Government has no policy and he will impress that fact upon its members.

A few kindred spirits celebrated the appointment of the new postmaster the other day, at the Carlisle Hotel. Their toast to the powers-that-be was

"Here's to the Conservative Party. May it live long and prosper. And to Hell with old Laurier and the Liberal Government." These are the men that are seeking dismissals for the present office holders on the grounds of "offensive partisanship."

Speaking of the close of navigation on the St. John River, Dr. Curry of the St. J. R. S. Co. says that the defeat of Reciprocity did away with the hope of a greatly increased freight trade for his steamers. The farmers now realize the mistake they made and as Dr. Curry expresses it "They kicked against Reciprocity and now they are kicking themselves to think they have lost it." Afterthoughts are very often disastrous.

A FIGHTING SESSION?

That the Liberals in Parliament intend to put up a party vigorous fight

is already apparent. At any rate the conditions as they exist at this moment do not justify the belief that there will be a short session, or an easy one. Sir Wilfrid Laurier's observations upon the election of Speaker not only indicate a fight, but the lines along which it is likely to proceed. His policy, apparently, is to attack the whole government along the lines of the Nationalists of Quebec. He will try to make clear to the country that the Conservatives of Ontario and of the other provinces have made an alliance with the Quebec extremists which is fraught with danger to the whole Dominion. The extent to which this view may be accepted is, of course, a matter for the future, but it is easy to note that it is the kind of political cry which, if it does not affect present members, will have an influence upon elections to come. The Ottawa Free Press pretty strongly intimates that the public must expect a fighting time. It says that although the Liberal ranks were badly swept on polling day by the political storm, they are in a position "where they can present a formidable opposition." "Their men are mostly trained and seasoned politicians, who know the game and who can perceive the weak points in their opponents' armor. Under the leadership of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, they will present a united front to the political foe, and while playing the game fairly they will be able to keep the government busy for some months to come." This is modified by the statement that there is no intention to present any factious opposition. One is glad to note this rider to the statement that there will be work for many months, and there would be some justification if we were allowed to substitute "some months" for many.—Globe.
