### REV. G. D. IRELAND

Closes a Successful Pastorate. Twelve years in Charge of St Paul's.

Last Sunday Rev G D Ireland closed his pastorate with the congregation of St Paul's Presbyterian Church. Mr Ireland was to have left last December but at the earnest solicitation of the session and congregation agreed to extend the time until the first Sunday in March. Last Sunday evening Mr Ireland delivered his closing message to a very large congregation. In addressing the people he said he would take no text but would simply pass in review the work they as pastor and people had been endeavoring to do. They had stood and fought for the recognition of the great truths taught by the church. The relationship during all the period had been happy and cordial. He appreciated this all the more because he came to them, taking his first charge in the ministry. They did not endeavor to handicap him with the methods of previous pastors nor had they looked upon his methods with suspicion. He had great reason for being thankful in having a church composed of open minded people whose sympathies were broad and who while grasping and upholding the great essentials of religion yet were willing to try his methods and to trust in their successful working out. He recognized his weaknesses—for all men, no matter who they are, will blunder, but he was fortunate in having a people who were gracious.

In his sermons, Mr Ireland said, he had endeavored to set forth the highest principles of scripture. He had assumed the results of modern criticism yet had always made Christ the basis, he "did not seek to teach truth but taught Christ who is truth."

The Holy Scriptures had nothing to suffer from criticism. The congregation were not carping critics nor were they ungenerous. He had tried to keep the beaten path in so far as it was consistent with the views of scholars of world wide reputation. The pulpit was not a lecture desk but a place where facts relative to spiritual life are set forth. He had taught a living virile gospel which alone could point men to God. In urging a larger trust in God Mr Ireland said: if I have any last message it is this, "take no thought for the morrow" and to it would add "seek first the Kingdom of God." The message of trust is the reasonable one for men. Religion should not be a theory only but should be applied, it should act upon life being tutored by the inward monitor and thus working out the higher principles of the Kingdom.

He believed in the Catholicity of the Church. While standing for the traditions of his own church yet, his faith in the Catholicity of the church was so great that he saw the various denominations as parts of one great body all having a message and tending toward ultimate triumph for the Kingdom of God.

Mr Ireland said he might have left many years ago but felt that his work was not finished. In referring to his association with the session and with the church he spoke of the very happy intercourse and said he did hope to ever find friends as good and true as he had found here. In closing he urged the congregation to extend the same warm fellowship to his successor which they had given him.
