

BLUE MOUNTAIN CAVE; FORMER NEW BRUNSWICKER TELLS GREWSOME STORY OF VICTORIA COUNTY'S MYSTERY---A GREAT CHIEF SANG HIS DEATH SONG ON BLUE MOUNTAIN--TREASURES BURIED IN ITS DEPTHS AND ENTRANCE NEVER FOUND BONES OF A THOUSAND RED MEN THERE

In far away Prince Rupert an item in a New Brunswick paper carried me back half a century. The headline told of a mysterious cave in Victoria county and the article went on to state that great excitement had been caused by the reputed discovery of a cave in Blue Mountain, Victoria Co. My grandfather told me the tale many times and I more than once spent hours in the cave.

In the war of 1812 my grandfather was a member of the New Brunswick company, whose March, from the "City by the Sea" to Quebec, has been celebrated in story and song.

They went by way of Blue Mountain where the snow lay ten, twenty and thirty feet deep. History has never recorded the fact but the company rested for three days in the Cave--led there by my grandfather when they had well nigh perished in a terrific blizzard. From his father, in whose veins ran the blood of the Kings of the New Brunswick wilds--before the white man came, he had learned of the cave and from him he learned the story of the last stand of a tribe of Indians who fought for the right to live and who had been driven a thousand miles from their hunting grounds in New York state. Before the poisoned arrow and

bloody axe of a blood-thirsty foe, the tribe travelled over a continent and settled in Carleton Co. Here for years they fished, hunted and raised their crops, and it was during this time a young chief found the cave at Blue Mountain and the wise men of the tribe resolved to use it should the time ever come they should need a refuge. The large stone door with holes through it blocks one entrance--there is another higher up the mountains and a third no man ever found.

The bones of a thousand red men are buried in the cave--but one survivor lived to tell the horrible tale of fight, flight and dreadful massacre of the peace loving Indians--who centuries ago tilled the soil where Woodstock stands. Their enemies came from the coast, they came up the river--the big river--painted naked devils--the village ran blood, over half the tribe perished there--the rest led by the young chief sought refuge in the cave at "Blue Mountain." There the implacable foe found them and when the hot summer sun had baked the trees, dried the leaves and caked the soil above and below, behind and around, they fired the mountain so that the cave became an oven and but one escap-

ed, a boy, young and strong, who many years after became a great chief among his captors. He never forgot his people and sang his death song a century after on "Blue Mountain" and he is buried in the dust of his forefathers within the cave--whose massive door was placed there by his adopted people and whose graven images resembling dogs were found within the cave where death from heat and smoke had been succeeded by petrification.

The treasures of the slain tribe are there--but the superstitious Indians could never overcome the horrors of the interior of the cave and no white man ever found the third entrance directly over where the treasures lie buried.

HOULTON PRISONERS NOT GUILTY; APPLAUSE GREETED VERDICT

Houlton, Me., Dec. 15--"What is your verdict?" asked Deputy Clerk of Courts W. B. Clark, as the jury in the Jacobson case filed in at 1.46 Saturday afternoon, being only three hours and nineteen minutes. "Not guilty," said Foreman Robin-

son in a voice that penetrated to the farthest corner of the court room.

Applause that the sheriff was powerless to stop followed the announcement of the verdict which freed Rev. Charles Nelson Emelius, Mrs. Annie Jacobson and Edgar Jacobson, charged with killing August Jacobson at New Sweden, June 12, 1911.

Mrs. Emelius was the first to reach the side of her husband, mother and brother after the verdict had been announced. Tears of joy shone in the eyes of all four. Judge Haley thanked the jury for the efficient manner in which it had discharged its duties. The prisoners were discharged and the most sensational and longest trial ever held in northern Maine was ended.

For over a half an hour after the adjournment of court, the crowd in the court room rushed forward to grasp the hand of Mr. and Mrs. Emelius, Mrs. Jacobson and their attorneys, R. W. Shaw and Hessel Shaw. The happiest people in Maine last evening were the three who have been on trial for the past ten days. At the railroad station last evening The Telegraph representative saw them as they were taking the train for their home in New Sweden. Mr. Emelius said:

"I knew the truth would finally be revealed. We are so grateful to all who have been so kind to us. We will never be able to show half the gratitude for the many kindnesses shown us by our attorneys. I shall go back to my church at Stockholm and take up my duties once again."

In his charge to the jury, Judge Haley said in part: "To you is given the responsibility for deciding on the facts of the case. You are to decide the case on all the evidence. Consider whether witnesses testified truthfully or falsified. Take no sides. Weigh the testimony and see what it is worth."

He explained the difference between manslaughter and murder, and told the jury men to give no weight to

the indictments returned by the grand jury against the respondents. "You should disregard the suicide note except the suicide intent. A chain or circumstantial evidence is no stronger than its weakest link," said Judge Haley. "It should stand the test."

"Use your own judgment in regard to the testimony of the experts. Weigh the testimony of Dr. Lagerson, who first declared August Jacobson was a suicide and afterwards that he had been murdered."

He charged that they must be convinced beyond a reasonable doubt that murder was committed.

PARDON OF FORMER WOODSTOCK MAN CAUSES PROTEST

Governor Foss Showed Clemency to Dr. A. D. Shea, Sentenced to Seven Years in Prison last Spring

Boston, Dec. 14--The district attorney's office and several prominent physicians are joining in a spirited protest against the pardon of Doctor Alfred D. Shea, of Cambridge, formerly of Woodstock, N. B.

He was pardoned by the governor's council on Wednesday. He was serving seven years in the state prison for performing an illegal operation on Wandia Washiewiske, a Polish girl. He was convicted last April and those who oppose the pardon say that he should have been kept in prison longer.

Shea is forty-seven years old. He came to Boston in December, 1890, worked for a time as bookkeeper, and was later employed in the laboratory of a south end physician where he remained fifteen years. He was graduated from Tufts College, Medical School in 1901 and for eleven years had been a practitioner.
