## FREDERICTON MEETS DEFEAT AT HANDS OF McMAHON'S COLTS

Woodstock Wins League Game by Score of 5 to 3 on Home Grounds—Hanley the New Twirler Pitches Good Ball

With a new pitcher in the box and every man playing ball, the local team trimmed Fredericton 5 to 3 on the home diamond Tuesday afternoon. The diamond was in bad shape owing to the heavy rains and quite a bunch of errors were rolled up. Hanley, the locals new South-paw, pitched a splendid game, allowing but five hits, two of these in the first innings, when he was standing ankle deep in the mud. Brown for Fredericton pitched good ball, but in the 4th inning he and several other members of his team made a spectacular fight in the league leaders big air ship and when they came to earth again Woodstock had scored five times. Brown as a rule is not strong on the aviation stunt, and perhaps he made the trip to please the large crowd of fans who were witnesses of the ascent. Six hits were made off his delivery, four of these being in one inning when the locals played the hit and won game to perfection.

Following is a summary of the game:  
1—Fredericton—Keaney walks, Ganley failed to reach 1st, Dugan singled but was caught napping off first, Bob Conley singled, Keaney scored but Larry Conley couldn't reach 1st ahead of the ball.

1—Woodstock—Williams out 1st, Lamoury singled, Duff failed to reach 1st bag, O'Donnell walked, Perley flied to Keaney.

2—Fredericton—Hoyt struck out, Fitzgerald hit safe, Wilder and Brown died on way to 1st.

2—Woodstock—Black walked but was caught stealing 2nd, Delano hit safe, Stone flied to L. Conley and Hanley didn't reach 1st.

3—Fredericton—Keaney safe on Williams error, Ganley bunted safe but was caught at 3rd, Keaney scored on Dugan's hit, but P. J. died off 2nd, Bob Conley foul to Duff.

3—Woodstock—Williams out 1st, Lamoury flied to L. Conley, Duff struck out.

4—Fredericton—L. Conley sent a hot one to Williams who stabbed it and got it to 1st ahead of the runner, Hoyt out 1st, Fitzgerald flied to O'Donnell.

4—Woodstock—O'Donnell safe on Wilder error, Perley hit safe, Black bunted safe, Delano struck out, Stone's drive scored O'Donnell and Perley, Hanley hit the seam for two bags, scoring Black and Stone, Williams hit stole 2nd and 3rd, Hanley scored Lamoury and Duff went out by the air line.

5—Fredericton—Wildes and Brown went the strike out route, Keaney reached 1st but was caught off the bag a moment later.

5—Woodstock—O'Donnell reached 1st, stole 2nd but caught at 3rd, Perley out 1st, Black got around to 3rd, Delano out 1st.

6—Fredericton—Ganley struck out, Dugan singled, Bob Conley walked but was caught off 2nd, L. Conley reached 1st, Dugan scored, Hoyt flied to Delano.

6—Woodstock—Stone reached 1st but caught on 3rd, Hanley sacrificed, Williams out 1st.

7—Fredericton—Fitzgerald sent a high one to Black, Wildes couldn't get to 1st, Brown just made the bag in time, but Keaney sent a nice one to Duff.

7—Woodstock—Delano safe on Hoyt's error but was caught off the bag a moment later, Duff and O'Donnell couldn't beat the ball to 1st.

8—Fredericton—Ganley flied to Delano, Dugan fouled to Stone, B. Conley drew a pass, L. Conley handed Delano a high one.

2—Woodstock—Perley walked, Black struck out, Delano didn't reach 1st.

Fitzgerald out 1st, Hale sent one to O'Donnell.

## MARATHONS COP 5-6 VICTORY IN WRETCHED GAME

### WOODSTOCK GIVES GAME AWAY

A large crowd of fans witnessed the presentation of a game of ball by the locals to the Marathons, Wednesday afternoon. It was Woodstock's game to do what they liked with, and they gave it away. It was a mixture of good and bad base ball, both teams contributing their share of mis-plays and errors. In the seventh inning Delano retired having hurt his hand and up to that time but two hits were made off his delivery. Whitney went in with three men on and none out, but by good work, backed up by Duff's running catch of a hard fly, retired the side scoreless. Woodstock had four earned runs, the fifth coming in when Winters threw the ball to second with nobody covering the bag. The Marathons had but three earned runs, the others being made on Woodstock's errors. Two hits were made off Whitney. Winters pitching for the Marathons was found for nine hits. Umpire Duffy gave much better satisfaction than on the previous day.

### Reformed Baptist Camp Meetings Very Successful

The Camp Meetings at Beulah and Riverside Camp Grounds, owned and conducted by the Reformed Baptist Alliance, closed last Sunday evening. Both camp meetings were very successful. The forty-sixth annual meet of the Provincial Rifle Association opened Tuesday at Sussex.

Many of the marksmen shot in the extra series at 600 yards but the results will not be announced until later in the week. The first match this morning was the Nursery in which much interest was taken and several tried for prizes.

The first prize was a gold watch and the shooting for it was most commendable. There were three possible scores by Sergeant Smith, 19th Field Battery, Moncton; Pte. Crandle, 67th Regiment, Woodstock; and A. G. Staples, Rifle Association, St. John, tying with a total of 35 points. They will shoot off later.

## TOWN COUNCIL

The Council met Friday night with Mayor Ketchum and Couns. Jones, Mair, Gibson, Balmain and Dibblee present.

The minutes of previous meetings were not read, as the record book was not available. The school trustees through E. K. Connell, Secy., presented their annual report. Sewers were ordered put down on Charles St. North, and Union South.

John Bagley, driver of the town team, was appointed to keep the crossings clean between the hay-scales and the Reformed Baptist Church. Supt. Fields was requested to see that all crossings were scraped off and other necessary work done on Connell street and from the bridge to Lower Corner.

The Imperial Packing Company came up for discussion and the matter was referred to the whole Council with power to take whatever action was considered advisable.

The excessive freight rates of the C. P. R. was again brought to the attention of the Council by Coun. Dibblee and caused quite a breezy discussion. Couns. Jones, Dibblee and Balmain were appointed to see the merchants and meet with the Board of Trade in an effort to arrive at some means to get a reduction of freight rates or bring the matter before the railway commission.
