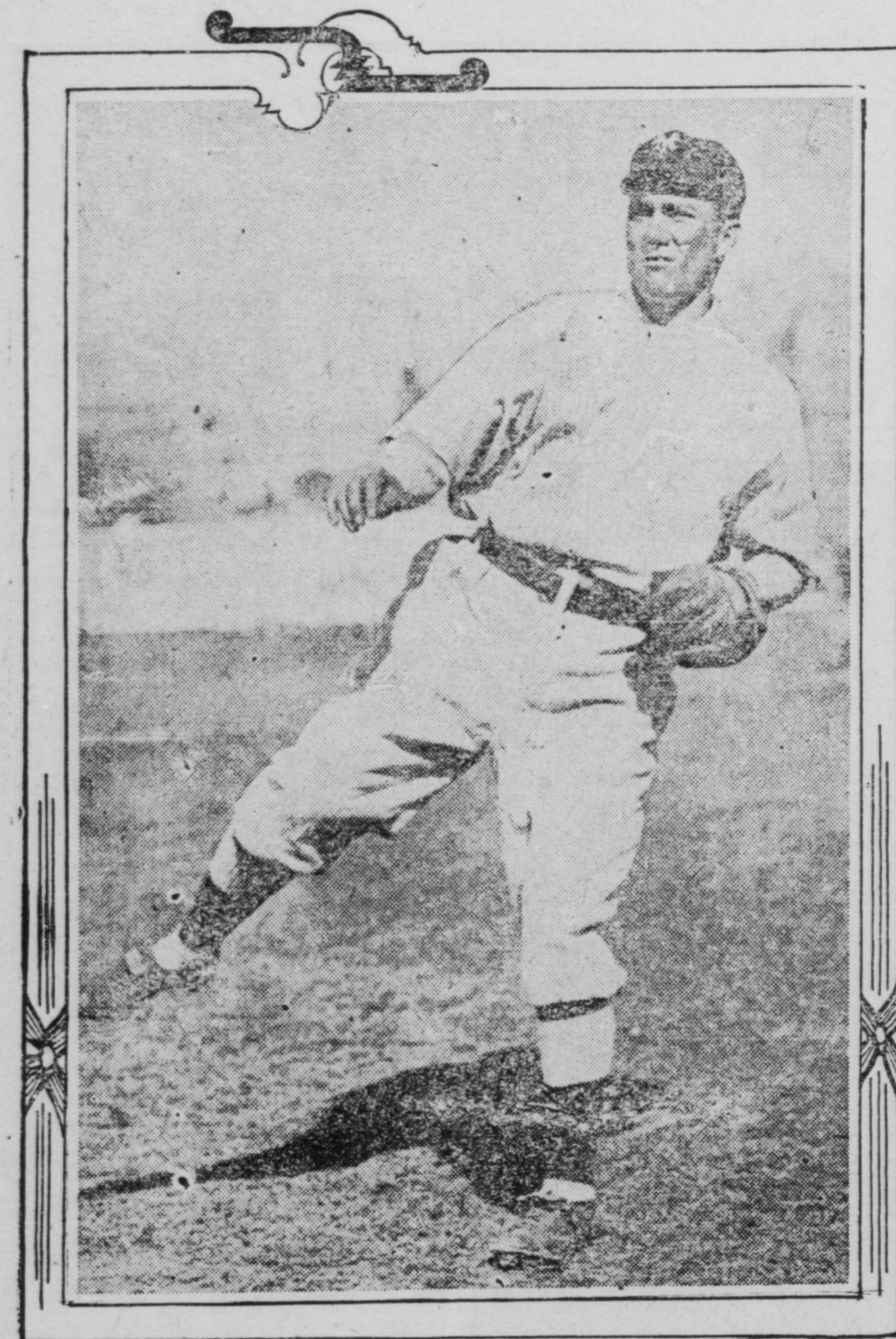


SPORTING EVENTS

Delano was one of the players who was not afraid to work, as the many times he appeared in the games will show. He took his defeats without any excuses and was modest over his wins. He was well liked by the fans and players.

Frederickton is to be congratulated not only on the playing of the team, but on the gentlemanly conduct of the players all through the season. The spirit shown by the fans in the hearty support of the team will have a lasting effect on the game.

A hotly contested game was played on Connell Park, Monday, between the Broadway nine and Fisher Memorial School, resulting in a victory for the former by a score of 6 to 2. McGibbon was the slab artist for Broadway and had 3 strike-outs. Jones of the Fisher School had 11 strikeouts to his credit, but received very ragged support. The teams play again Monday and a great game is expected.

A nine to six beating was the farewell hand extended by the Greeks to the Woodstock Colts on Thursday afternoon. About 400 spectators witnessed the adieu which was most uninteresting, both teams putting up a ragged exhibition of ball and playing a "don't care" game throughout. The Greeks put the game on ice in the opening inning when they tallied seven runs and probably the big lead was responsible for much of the disinterestedness displayed. Winkler was in the box for the locals and was found for seventeen hits for a total of twenty-one bases. The hits were not as timely as the Marathons—eight off Hanley, however, and as a result the grim man got away with the prize package.—Globe.

In the last game of the season here Saturday, Houlton trimmed Woodstock, 5 to 2. The home team put up a wretched game, piling up error after error, and failed to show its usual ability at the bat. Aside from pretty catches by Black, there were no fielding features. Ryan, a local boy, distinguished himself and in some instances is quite up with some of the big men of the team. Urquhart, who twirled for Houlton, was steady and effective and his team played good ball behind him. Delano and Hanley were hit freely and their support was not in the same class as given to their rival on the slab. Duff and Callahan were both out of the game on account of injuries.

And now the Woodstock Colts have gone. They gathered up their togs and made their departure at the close of Thursday afternoon's game. The team left here in the cellar position and as they play their last game of the season at Woodstock today it looks as though they are in the cellar to stay. Though last in the league race, the Colts made a gallant fight all season and were always looked up as dangerous factors. They made one bad break here when they put on July the first afternoon, but that has since been forgotten and after all it is the finish that counts. The finale was very harmonious and Woodstock would again be welcomed into the league next season, but it is doubtful if they will enter.—Globe.

CLARENCE M. SPRAGUE WINS CHAMPIONSHIP

Defeats Wylie of Halifax in All Day Match

Clarence M. Sprague won the amateur golf championship of the maritimes Friday on the local links, beating H. W. Wylie, of Halifax, by four up and three to play. The men played eighteen holes in the morning and finished all even after a spirited struggle in which both played beautifully. In the afternoon Sprague was getting great length on his drive and his opponent's long game was a bit off. Wylie's irons, however, were very fine, and often if he topped his drive or got a short one his recoveries were admirable.

Sprague won the first three holes after lunch, halved the fourth and won the fifth and sixth, and so had the match well in hand. Wylie cut the lead down to four on the twenty seventh green, but Sprague won the twenty-eighth and his lead was then too big to be overcome. His long game was great. This match has established him as clearly the best amateur in these provinces. On a longer course his driving would give him an even greater advantage than it does on the short local course. The runner-up has shown much class throughout the meeting. He qualified with the lowest score turned in, and his thirty-two for nine holes against W. A. Henry was the best nine during the week Sprague had the best eighteen holes—69. Both the winner and the runner-up were warmly congratulated.

President H. B. Schofield presented the prizes at the club house late in the afternoon, and the recipients were heartily cheered.

As Mr. Schofield concluded the prize-giving a large white William goat appeared in front of the club house, led by a small boy. The animal (gyasutus capricornis, according to the Lingam goat expert) mounted the steps of the verandah, and Mr. Wylie, gingerly taking the tow-line and keeping out of butting distance, formally presented the animal to Mr. Sprague as captain of the New Brunswick team which beat Nova Scotia in the inter-provincial match on Thursday. "New Brunswick got Nova Scotia's goat, and here it is," said the orator, adding that the goat must be produced at Lingam next year, when Nova Scotia would proceed to win it back.

Joe Wood Wins Game

Joe Wood of the Boston Red Sox and Walter Johnson of the Washington club, the two leading twirlers of the American league and who many believe to be the best in the world, met in a real battle on the mound at Boston Friday, Wood pitching the Red Sox to victory over his renowned rival by the score of 1 to 0. The only tally of the game came with two out in the sixth when Speaker doubled and scored when Lewis also hit for two bases. Moeller barely touching the latter's drive into right field. Wood gave six hits, walked three and fanned nine, while Johnson gave five hits, passed one and struck out five. With men on bases Wood was invincible for, on several occasions when Washington had a chance to score, the pride of the Red Sox twirlers corps retired the hitter on strikes and pulled out of the hole. Both sides played errorless ball, behind their pitchers.

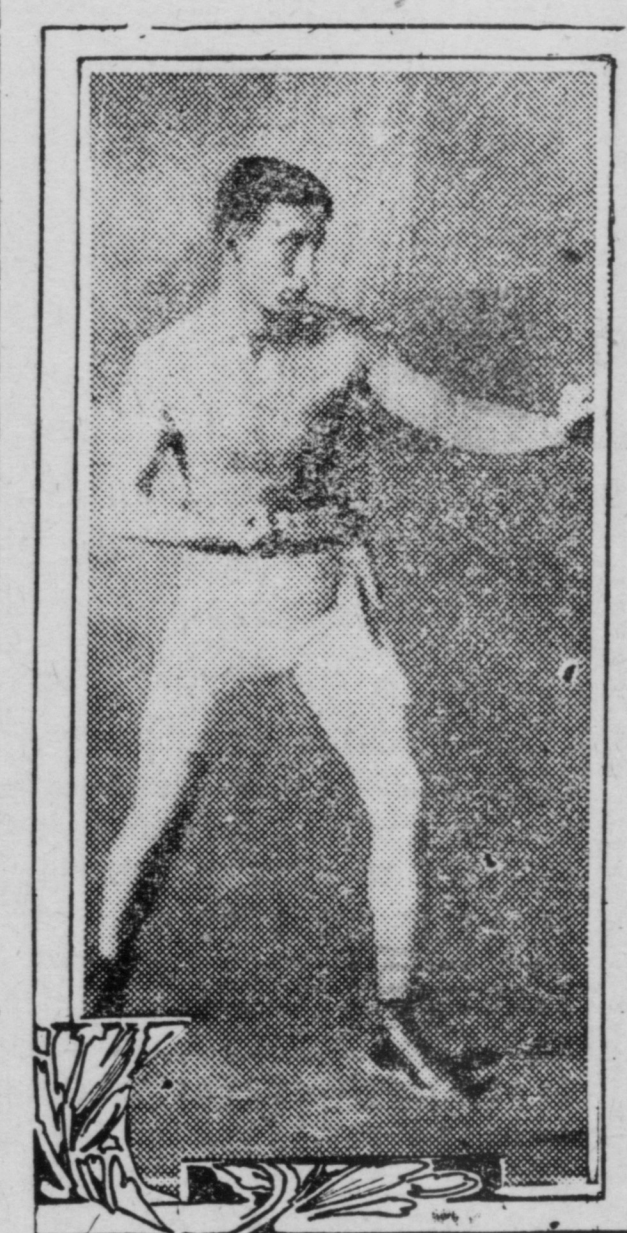

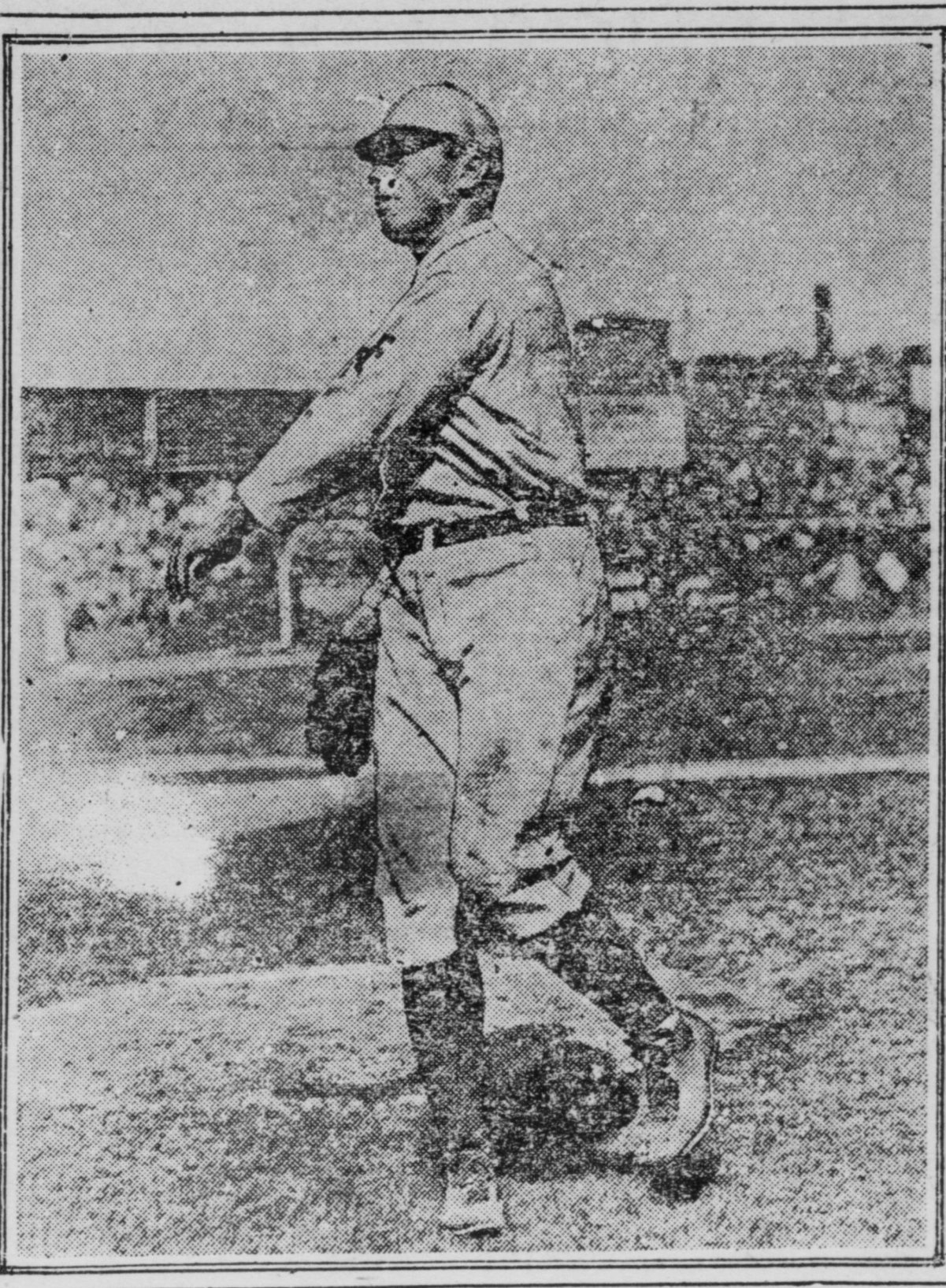
Austin is a clever boxer and his ring weight is 105 pounds. He insists that he is so good at that weight that he is the champion 105 pound boxer of the world.
