THE EXPERIMENTAL FARM

Director Grisdale Reports in Favor of Woodstock, But in Spite of Ideal Location and Big Money Bonus It Goes to York County

NATURE MADE CARLETON COUNTY THE CENTRE OF AGRICULTURAL DEVELOPEMENT

No Explanation Given of Change of Plans

The location for the new Experimental Farm for New Brunswick has been decided upon. Those who hoped that the natural claims of this County as the most suitable location for this important institution, would carry weight with the ministry at Ottawa, and that purely on its merits the choice would be made of Woodstock have been rudely disillusioned. It would seem as if all pretense that the present party in power intended to do anything to benefit this great agricultural county, has been abandoned.

We might appear to be giving vent to partisan malignity and spleen if we asserted that in the agricultural administration of this province, and of Canada, graft and incompetence have gone hand in hand in a veritable Rake's Progress. Our county representatives at Fredericton stand by and abet the robbery of Carleton County of its birthright. It is not through any accident that this part of New Brunswick is the center of agricultural development. Nature made it and it always will be that. Other parts of the province have their distinctive resources—lumber, minerals, fisheries—OURS IS AGRICULTURE.

When the Borden government came in, declaring its intention to do a whole lot for Agriculture, it was thought a fit moment to urge again the rights of Carleton County. Particularly, as by the will of the late L. P. Fisher there would be available a sum of money, amounting to about \$100,000, for an Agricultural College in connection with the proposed farm. A delegation comprising Messrs. George Balmaln, A. D. Holyoke, E. W. Mair, Dr. W. D. Rankin and Mr. Frank B. Smith, went to Ottawa. In view of the proposition they were authorized to make, it is not strange that the committee left the presence of the Minister of Agriculture, Hon. Mr. Burrill, with what they considered as substantially a promise that we should have the farm, although it was no secret that other interests were after it.

Last month, Mr. Grisdale, Director of the Experimental Farms, went over the province delegated to examine and make preliminary arrangements for purchase of possible sites. At Woodstock, the Smith farm was selected, the terms were satisfactory and Mr. Grisdale declared the location ideal. His report would appear to have been in favor of Woodstock, for his chief the Hon. Mr. Burrill took the matter up with the executors of the Fisher Estate, received assurance from Mr. A. B. Connell that the bequest of Mr. Fisher was available, only needing a little legislation, which there would be no trouble in getting, and it was reported at the time that Mr. Burrill had given assurance, amounting to substantially a promise, that this farm would come here. All at once, last week, the official announcement was made that Fredericton had been given the farm. That is all there is to it.

The land selected is as good as could be expected, about a mile below Fredericton, consisting of two or three farms, of which 40 acres may be called at the best only fair farming land, the rest being white birch and popple. The best of it is not good, only passable, yet here on this miserable site are to be conducted those demonstrations and experiments with grains, fruits and vegetables that shall instruct, not only present but future generations of farmers. Never before has just as good a prospect been so outraged in Canada, unless it may be in that stronghold of Toryism, Ontario, where the site of an Agricultural College and Farm was selected (Guelph) which now, on account of its poor soil and climate, is now acknowledged (if we may believe the latest Ontario Reports) to be in a section where, especially as regards fruits, the results of its works are of absolutely no benefit to the fruit growing sections of that province. We do not doubt that something may be done by scientific treatment of popple lands towards improving, just as, no doubt an artist might succeed in making a "silk purse out of a sow's ear," but it is an undertaking of much the same sort. If Agricultural improvement in this province is to begin with measures attempting to depose the bears from our bogs and popple lands, the outlook is certainly exceedingly cheerful.

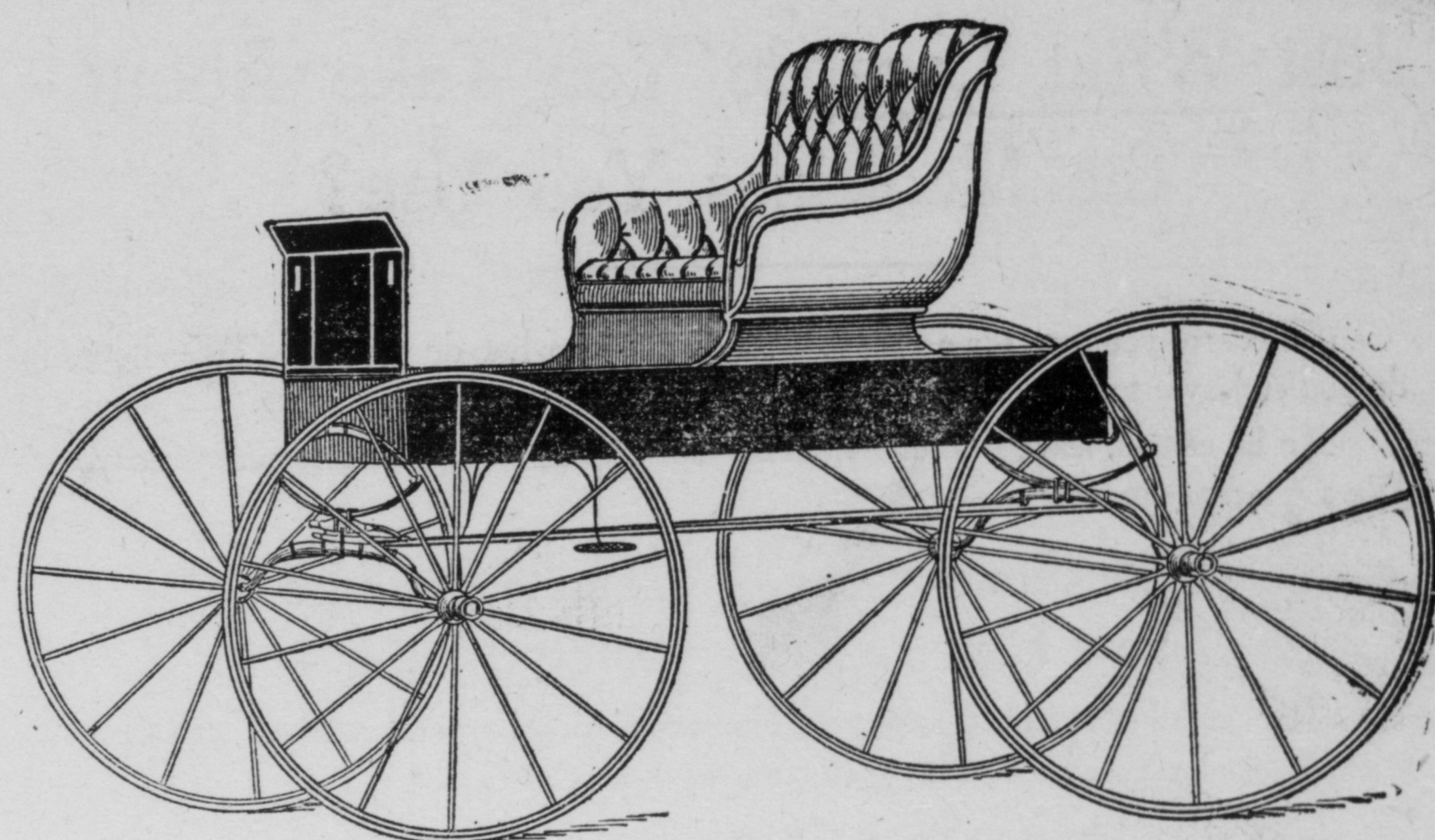
