

GOVERNMENT WILL STAVE OFF SESSION

The Panicky Ministers Are Not Anxious to Face Parliament, and Opening Will Probably Not Take Place Before the New Year

BY-ELECTION IN MACDONALD IS CAUSING PREMIER BORDEN A LOT OF WORRY

Haultain Retiring to the Seclusion of the Bench—Thanksgiving Day on October 28

Ottawa, Sept. 12.—The retirement of Hon. F. W. Haultain from the leadership of the Conservative Party in Saskatchewan, and his appointment to the Saskatchewan Supreme Court Bench in succession to Chief Justice Wetmore who retires on superannuation, may be expected shortly. Mr. Haultain has expressed a desire to retire from politics and will accept the position on the Bench for perhaps he is better fitted temperamentally and by training, than for active politics. The Opposition in the Saskatchewan Legislature are now casting about for a new leader, but so far without satisfactory results.

Present indications are that the Borden Government will not decide to meet Parliament until January. The question has not yet been formally considered by the Cabinet, but most of the Ministers and a majority of the members favor waiting until the new year, instead of assembling in late November, with a long Christmas recess.

The Government is becoming daily more impressed with the volume and difficulties of the work ahead, and is in no hurry to again join issue with Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his followers on the floor of the House.

It is expected that in any event the session will last well on into next summer and, judging by the experience of the past, prorogation is hastened little, if any, when a fighting session is on, by the preliminary pre-Christmas flow of oratory.

Moreover, a by-election is due in Macdonald, Manitoba, to fill the vacancy caused by the appointment of William Staples to the Grain Commission, but reports from the constituency are now decidedly unfavorable from the Government standpoint.

With a grain blockade in prospect for the next two or three months, and no "wider markets" to relieve the situation, the Cabinet is unwilling to bring on the election this fall, hoping for warmer water for the plunge after the acute stage of the blockade is past. If Parliament is not to meet until January the by-election can more easily be postponed.

Although the formal Order-in-Council, fixing the date for Thanksgiving Day this fall has not yet been passed, it is understood that the date recommended by the State Department is Monday, October 28th, and a proclamation will be issued shortly.
