## "WE WENT FEARLESSLY AND COURAGEOUSLY TO OUR DUTY WITHOUT AN APPEAL TO PASSION OR PREJUDICE"

### Ontario Responds to Laurier's Ringing Words—A Most Remarkable Triumph—Conservatives Restless at Incapacity of Borden Government—Voters Will Not Again Be Stampeded by Appeals to Passion and Prejudice

OTTAWA, October 9th.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier returned to the Capital to-day from the most remarkable series of triumphs throughout Ontario that have ever fallen to the lot of any public man in Canada. During a tour which lasted almost ten days, in the very heart of the Province which went so strongly against his Government at the last election, he was greeted with an enthusiasm and evident loyalty which proclaimed the fact that the people of Ontario realize the manner in which, they were deceived at the last election. Throughout the whole tour it was shown in marked manner that the people of Ontario were determined to make amends, not only when the next test comes at the polls, but now by showing their affection to the Liberal chief and their loyal confidence in his policy.

At Mount Forest, a town of about three thousand people, came the wonderful culmination of a wonderful tour. From far and wide the people of the district flocked in, some driving as much as twenty miles to attend the meeting, while special trains within a radius of fifty miles came, until about fifteen thousand people were gathered in the little town, more than it had ever attempted to accommodate before. It has been thought that with a rink holding four thousand people two meetings would be ample, but long before the time for the evening gathering had arrived the rink was crowded to suffocation. The Town Hall has hastily requisitioned, and another couple of thousand people gathered there, but still hundreds were unable to get within sound of the speakers. These

formed processions with torches, and their battle-cry was "We are returning to Laurier."

It is estimated that during this brief tour of Old Ontario, Sir Wilfrid and his colleagues addressed not less than fifty thousand people, and yet at not a single meeting did they meet with anything like opposition.

Everywhere there has ample evidence, not only that those Liberals who at last Election had been led astray by appeals to passion and prejudice now realized their mistake, but that the Conservatives themselves were becoming restless at the increasing evidence of incapacity shown by the Borden Government.

More than that on every side there was evidence of a growing tide of indignation at the campaign of whispered calumnies and secret appeals to racial and religious prejudices which had been carried on throughout Ontario at the last election.

Throughout the whole Province responded in noble fashion to the ringing words of Laurier "We went fearlessly and courageously to our duty, without an appeal to passion or prejudice." Now that the people have seen the failure of the present Government to deal with the Navy, or with any other of the great questions, after a whole year in office, they have the remedy in their own hands and will apply it.

"Heaven is my witness that what I have done I did because it was for the good of Canada, and my duty as a loyal Canadian and British subject, and I would do it over again."

Resolved—That we heartily endorse the actions of John Redmond, leader of the Irish Parliamentary Party, in his efforts to secure for his 'people the rights of self-government, and note with pleasure that, unless all signs fail, in the near future, the people of Ireland will have the same rights that we enjoy in Canada—Home Rule.

Resolved—That the thanks of this convention are due and are hereby tendered to Revs. Fathers Coughlin and McMurray for their kindness in attending the convention and the interest displayed by them in the welfare of the order.

Resolved—That we tender our sympathy to Mrs. Hugh Judge and family on the death of her brother, Dr. B. Gallagher, a member of Division No. 2, and to Bro. James Guest of the same Division upon the death of his father.

### MILITARY OFFICIALS VISIT WOODSTOCK

#### Look Over Government Property --Surprised at Treatment Accorded the 67th Regt. Band---Investi- gation in Order

Major Powell, D. A. A. G., Halifax, Staff Sergt. Spaulding and Lieut. Hueston have been here this week on a visit of inspection of the Armory and also of the equipment of the different military bodies of the town and county. It is reported that some suggestions will be made along lines of improvement that will add to the efficiency of the service.

Among other matters brought to the attention of the officers was the question of the use of the Armory by the 67th band. While nothing definite could be done by the inspecting officers they were astonished that a regularly organized military band had been refused the use of the Armory for band purposes and intimated that the matter would be brought to the attention of Hon. Sam Hughes.

The band is now paying rent for practice rooms, while under the old rule they were given a room in the Armory for their rehearsals. This room is now used as a store-room. The matter will not be dropped until the band get their rights and are allowed the privileges now enjoyed by private individuals, in so far as occupation of the Armory is concerned.
