CONDUCTOR GIVEN 60-DAY SENTENCE

Manslaughter Charge Also Brings \$500 Fine After Grindstone Wreck

Bangor, Me., Feb. 15.—Herbert G. Dibble, of Houlton, conductor of an excursion train which on July 28th last collided with a regular train on the Bangor and Aroostook Railroad at Grindstone, killing nine persons, pleaded guilty to manslaughter and was sentenced to serve sixty days in jail and pay a fine of \$500. Earlier in the day Dible was indicted by the grand jury.

Justice Bird, of the Supreme Court, in sentencing the defendant, said that while he realized that there was no criminal intent on his part, he believed it necessary that servants and agents of public service corporations be made to realize their duty and responsibility to the public.

Dible started immediately upon the service of his sentence and will, it is understood, pay his fine.

MAN TRY TO SHOW RICHESON INSANE

Boston, Feb. 15.—There is no doubt that insanity will be the plea on which the counsel for Clarence V. T. Richeson, who is now in the Charles street jail under sentence of death for the murder of Avis Linnell, will attempt to save his life.

It is quite probable alienists will be called into the case to examine the minister, who is said to be suffering from a severe nervous strain in prison. If it could be proved to the satisfaction of the governor and the council that Richeson is insane, he would be sent to an insane hospital instead of the electric chair.

When Attorney William A. Morse, junior counsel for Richeson, conferred with the governor in regard to a petition soon to be presented, asking for commutation of the sentence, the governor did not appear favorably disposed. Sheriff Quinn, who was present, declared to the governor that Richeson was a mental wreck.

He doubted very much, he said, if the condemned minister's mind would bear up and survive the terrible strain under which it was laboring. According to the latest reports received from the prison and through Attorney Morse, Richeson's chief trouble is inability to sleep. He is pale and thin, it is said, and as the light is kept in his cell all the time and the guards are changed every forty minutes, it is difficult for him to rest.

Mr. Morse branded as an absolute falsehood the statement that Governor Foss had notified him he would consider no petition for a commutation of Richeson's sentence.

THE UNEMPLOYED IN THE WEST

Hundreds Walking Streets of Vancouver Looking for Work—Genuine Seekers:

(Vancouver Province.)

Up at the city hall today the civic employment bureau is crowded with would-be workers. Occasionally some body rings in for a man to do something about his house, but for every job there are a dozen men eager to take it. The same thing is true of the employment agencies.

Last night a hundred men crowded into a little old fashioned church, which once housed the Seventh Day Adventists. It stands on the southwest corner of Gore and Keefer, and last night it bulged with the crowds who lay sprawled about the floor or stood in the corners to snatch sleep or keep warm.

Congested misery was marked on the faces of those who turned up toward the lamp which a reporter used to light his way over their prostrate forms. They are hungry and cold and some of them are angry at the defiant "iron hand" message that the mayor sent them.

In a little room at the back of the church, where once the minister donned his surplice, a great cook-stove stood on four bricks and sent its flames roaring up the chimney.

Around about lay half empty sacks of potatoes and in between a half dozen men sat or lay prone.

They were the helpers.

Yesterday they served three hundred men with food. Common, but wholesome, was the food handed out to a long line of hungry men.

At noon they served a mulligan, a delectable compound of meat and vegetables and much loved by hungry men. Bread and cheese and weak tea eked out the supply when it dwindled.

And after that there was nothing. The men who served are poor. Not

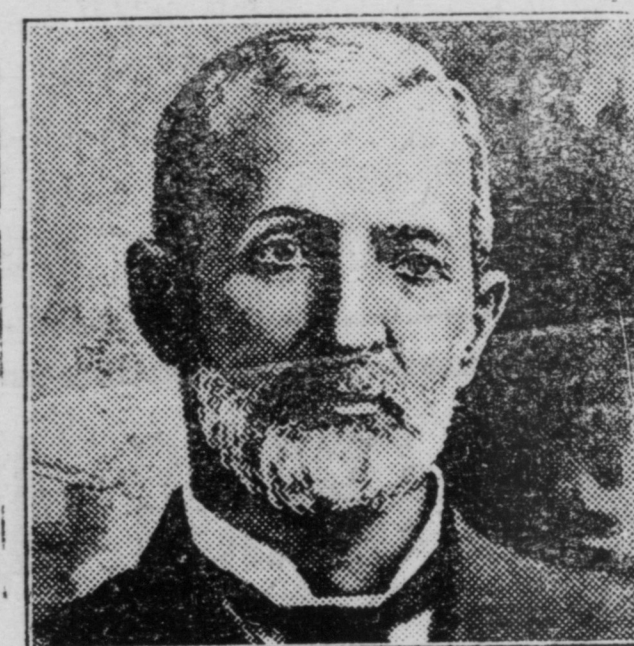

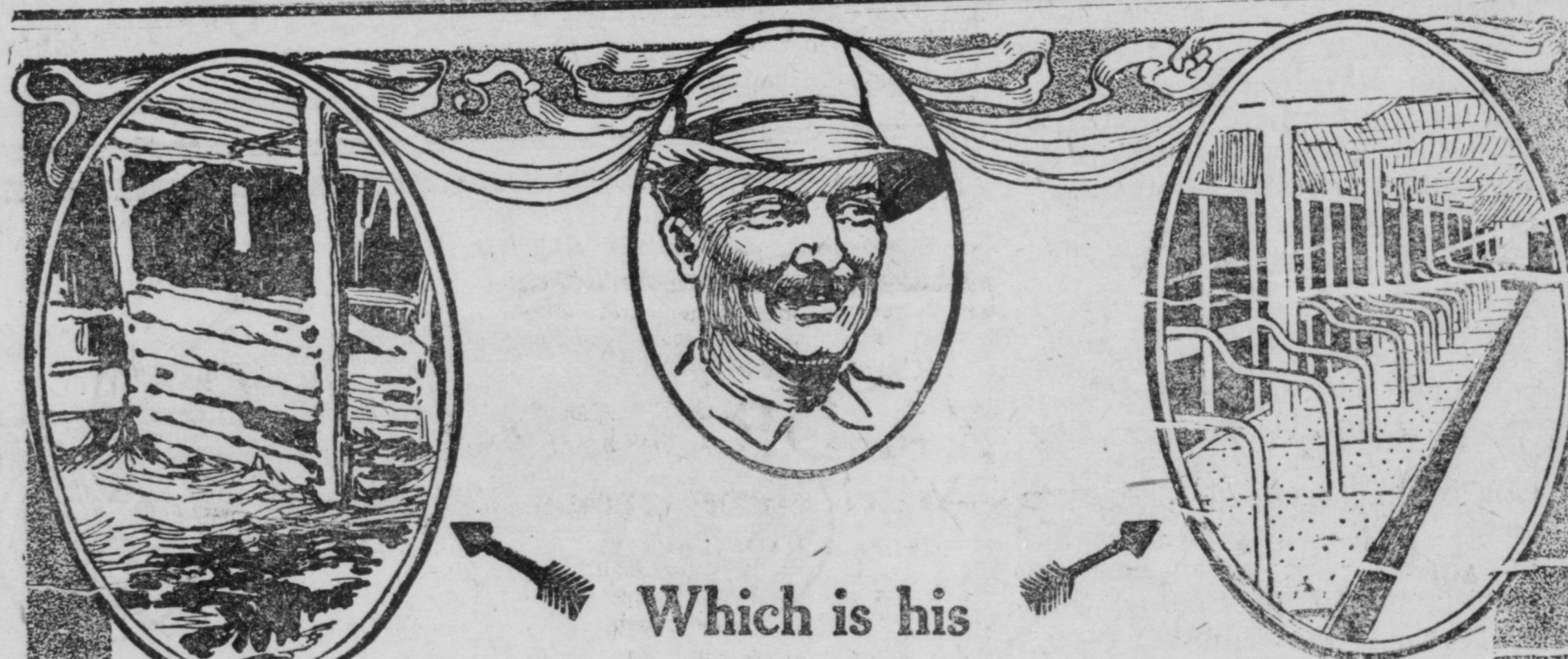
