

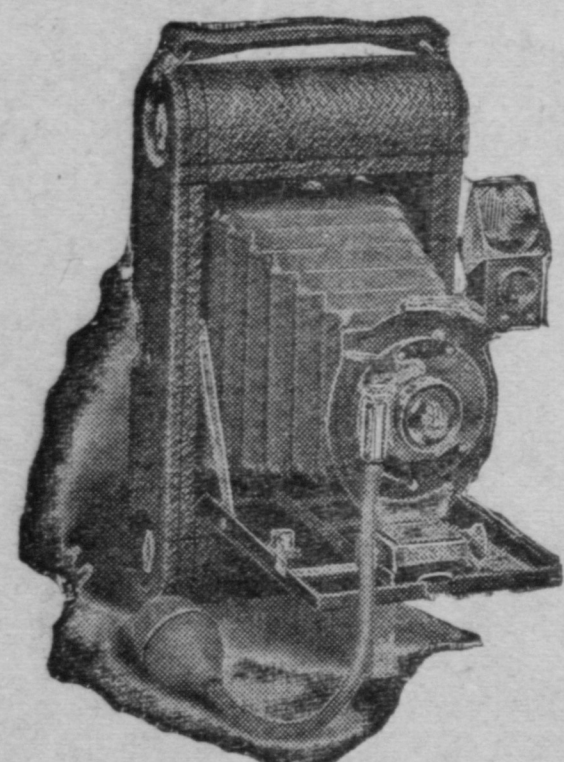

## WOODSTOCK MANUAL TRAINING DEPARTMENT MAKES CREDITABLE EXHIBIT

### The Work of the Past Year Much Admired—Teacher and Students Show Great Skill—The Prize Winners

Adequate and varied provision for education along all lines conducive to proper training of the young student, is a requisite that demands the attention of school boards all over the country. That the educational board of this town are alive to the school interests entrusted to them has been demonstrated along all lines but perhaps one department deserves special mention—The Manual Training.

The work of the young people in this branch has been under the direction of Miss Smith and her knowledge, with the keen preception of the young pupils has been demonstrated to a wonderful degree in the work performed during the past year, which work has been on exhibition in the large show window of W. F. Dibblee & Sons store during the past week.

This work is a practical exhibition of something that really ought to be known and is something that can be utilized after it is known.

In this work of Manual Training, Miss Smith and her pupils have made a splendid showing that glows with unusual brightness.

The different pieces of furniture in the exhibit are all made from fumed chestnut—which is perhaps the only wood of this kind used in the schools of the province. It is put through a process of steaming with strong ammonia which gives it a much better finish than other woods. Oak and chestnut are the only woods affected by fuming.

A chair made by the late Francis Riordan is certainly a masterpiece of skill. Competent judges have pronounced it almost perfect in every detail.
