THE FESTIVAL OF FAITH.

Like the stars, the days differ in glory; and no day of all the wonderful and beautiful year brings to the human heart a message more precious and exalting than the message of Easter. It is the day dedicated to the sublimest hope that stirs the soul of man—the day which is the festival of our faith that life is ever lord of death.

It was no accident that Easter was fixed by the fathers of the church to fall in the season of the pagan celebration in honor of the returning spring. But that early celebration was sadly incomplete. All the symbolism of the spring time which is felt by bud and brook and bird is now fittingly employed in a sense that was not dreamed of before the stone was rolled away from the door in the new sepulcher which Joseph of Arimathea had hewn out of the rock.

There are those to whom the social or commercial aspect of Easter seems most important. To them the season brings only the superficial happiness of its pagan incompleteness. But the message of Easter is more than the story of renewed physical existence, more than a consolation for death, more than a mere promise of future life.

The death which we know is its own justification, but immortality is a logical necessity, once God's existence is granted. The laws of nature permit no waste. The man of science and the priest and the prophet stand side by side in holding immortality to be the fit climax of God's creative work—of the evolution that has been unspeakably beautiful and marvelous in all its myriad stages. And the glorious lesson of Easter is that the love of the Father is boundless and everlasting.

EUREKA!

Not the least of those for whom fame should be spoken is the gentleman who has invented a hen's nest, consisting, we are informed, of a meal sack, which is arranged with a hole in the bottom. This, we are told, is particularly efficacious in the case of hens which eat their eggs. As soon as the egg is laid it rolls to the bottom of the bag and drops through the hole upon some straw. The recent debate in the Dominion Parliament on the Valley Railway question and the heated outburst by Premier Flemming in the legislature a few days ago should convince all those not blinded by partizanship that there is "a nigger in the wood-pile," in connection with this great project.—Mail.

OBITUARY

The funeral obsequies of the late Colin M. King took place on Tuesday afternoon at Lakeville, the birth place and early home of the deceased.

The service at the house was conducted by Revs. Henry Pierce, Superintendent of the Centreville Circuit, Premier Flemming in the legislature assisted by M. Manuel, Pastor of the Presbyterian church, G. Ayers of those not blinded by partizanship Jacksonville and R. W. Weddall of Woodstock, of whose church Mr. King was a member. "Jesus Lover of My Soul" and "I am Thine O Lord" were impressively sung. Prayers were offered, appropriate selections from the "Word of God" were read, and a suitable address delivered by Mr. Weddall, who founded his remarks upon the words of Saint Paul. "The sufferings of the present time are not worthy to be compared with the glory that shall be revealed in us" the text chosen by Mr. King was some time before his death.
