## Acadia Defeats U. N. B.

Acadia retained possession of the King-Richardson trophy for another year when they defeated U. N. B., 13 to 3, at Fredericton on Friday. This is the fourth time Acadia has won the coveted trophy, and they are jubilant over the result of the game. Acadia's half line outclassed the Red and Black line, and the Acadia quarters handled the Mall faultlessly. The forwards of both teams had a busy day, and while Acadia's weight was an important factor, the honors were about even. The field was in a wretched condition, there being large pools of water in many places.

The members of his club are to report for the trip to Macon, Ga., on March 20th. All the young blood are to accompany the team and will be given a good trial. The club has three left-hand pitchers—Lush, Hearn and Kubat. Only one of these is to be carried and the other two will be let go.

## Matty is Wealthy

New York, Nov. 8—Christy Mathewson, hero of the 1912 world series, can well afford to retire from baseball.

Matty has many friends in New York, and he has received many safe tips on the stock market. A year ago an intimate friend declared that Matty had accumulated more than \$250,000, so it looks as if "Big Six," one of the greatest twirlers that ever wore toeplates, will be able to retire and live in comfort. He is one of the few great pitchers who saved his money.

Cy Young is not in want, but he has not much. Bill Dineen, hero of the St. Louis fans a couple of decades back, is now umpiring for a living. Rube Waddell manages to dispose of his salary as fast as it comes due, and he still has to work his salary wing to make ends meet, though his days of usefulness as a pitcher are fast reaching an end. And there are other twirlers of as great, or greater fame, who are unable to spend their old days in comfort.

Joe Wood, of the Boston Red Sox, who was the American League's greatest distributor of goose-eggs last season, blanked five of the seven teams that faced him, Cleveland and Philadelphia alone escaping Smokey Joe whitewashed the Highlanders three, the Nationals, Browns and White Sox each twice and the Tigers once. Three of the Bostonian's wins were marked by the narrowest possible deciding score—1 to 0—the pitchers he conquered being Walter Johnson, who, like Wood, stood well up in the voting for the Chalmers Trophy; Edgar Willett, and George McConnell. When Wood kept the Tigers from the plate he had to toil for eleven innings, and then a fumble by Jim Delahanty was of great assistance to the Red Sox in getting their one run.

Wood was the lone American League to reach double figures in whitewashes. Walter Johnson, of the Nationals, was the runner-up to Wood in using the brush. Ed. Walsh, of Chicago, reached third, another Eddie—the left-handed Plank, of Philadelphia—being number 4.

Boston was the hardest team to whitewash, and Chicago the easiest. All told there were 79 games in which one team was kalsomined and one contest in which both drew ciphers.

## THE RING

Wolgast Not Anxious to Lose Title. The "championship battle for the lightweight title" between Ad Wolgast and Joe Mandot, which took place at New Orleans on Monday night, was a poor arrangement. Wolgast was willing to have the bout so announced, but before he would enter the ring he insisted that there must be no decision by the referee. There is no law against a referee deciding a fight in the "Desert City," and Wolgast's demand would tend to show that he was afraid for his title.

Wolgast's course before and after the bout smacked more of the sure thing fighter than of a champion. He seems imbued with the idea that the title is his and that nobody has a right to box him for it with a chance of winning except by the knockout route. Wolgast earned the crown from Battling Nelson on a technical knockout, for Nelson was on his feet when the battle was stopped. Wolgast does not wish to accord similar privileges to his adversaries, hence the no-decision clause in all his recent matches.

## Jack Johnson, in Jail, Unable to Furnish Bonds

NEGRO SHED TEARS AND OFFERED TO FURNISH CASH BAIL, BUT WITHOUT AVAIL.

Chicago, Nov. 8—Jack Johnson, champion heavyweight pugilist of the world, tonight occupied a cell in the county jail, due to his failure to furnish a \$30,000 bond for his release on a charge of violating the Mann act.

As he left the federal building, handcuffed to Deputy Marshal Edward Northrup after a futile plea not to have his wrist manacled, Johnson seemed greatly dejected but he said nothing. In his extended fight for the bond Johnson shed tears, pleaded, offered a cash bond in almost any amount.

Three prospective bondsmen failed to qualify, and one of them, Albert C. Jones, was sent to jail after he had failed to obtain a bond of \$10,000 for his appearance in court next Monday to answer a charge of contempt which was lodged against him by the court when he attempted to schedule property said to belong to his wife.

Tony May, another prospective bondsman was ordered out of court because he gave answers to questions which the court considered untruthful.

"Give cash bond, in any amount, but for goodness sake keep me out of jail," Johnson pleaded with his attorneys.

Both District Attorney Wilkerson and Judge Landis refused to consider a cash bond.

"An unparalleled attempt to swindle this court by offering unqualified bondsmen has been made," said Judge Landis. "I will not consider a cash bond."

Mr. Wilkerson said he understood that Johnson intended to leave this country on November 30 if he obtained his release. The offense with which Johnson is charged is not subject to extradition.

Several other charges against Johnson are to be investigated by the grand jury it is said.

District Attorney Wilkerson tonight said he intended to put Johnson on trial as soon as possible. The case probably will be called next week, it is said.

## SUICIDE FOLLOWS ON RESTIGOUCHE MURDER

Settler Kills Lumber Operator, Seriously Wounds Another, Ends Own Life

The woods in the vicinity of Anderson, a small settlement in the north-woods, along the International railway, and some miles from Campbellton, were the scene of a terrible tragedy on Saturday in which Peter Rioux, a settler, shot and killed Elvin Annett, a lumber foreman, seriously wounded John Glover, a lumber operator, and then killed himself with a shot from his rifle.

The reason given for the fearful happenings is that Rioux was under the impression that the men were cutting logs on his property. The murder was premeditated and done deliberately. Rioux followed Annett to the woods and shot at him from ambush, killing him on the second shot. He then went to where Glover was at work and fired at him, but did not make a clean shot, so that the man may possibly recover.

Rioux went further into the woods and when a posse under Chief of Police Hughes—formerly of St. John—was organized and went in search of him, they found his dead body with his rifle close by. Glover was taken to the hospital, while the dead body of Annett was taken care of by Undertaker Graham. A. E. G. McKenzie, a former St. John man, was one of those in the coroner's party to the scene of the crime.
