

HOUSEHOLD SUGGESTIONS

Dry salt sprinkled among your furs and under and on your carpets is an excellent preventive of moths.

Lamp chimneys will shine in a hurry if a little kerosene is put in the water with which they are washed.

A little kerosene added to warm water when washing windows, especially outside, will remove the sticky condition often found better than alcohol, ammonia, or whiting.

A scratch on polished furniture can be almost obliterated by rubbing vigorously with linseed oil.

A little alum put in the rinsing water, will restore any faded colors. A piece dissolved in the starch will greatly improve the appearance of ginghams, muslins and other wash goods.

To get rid of ants in the pantry, wash the shelves off with hot water, in which has been dissolved as much alum as the water will take up. If this doesn't bring results, sprinkle red pepper in all crevices.

Keep a small whisk-broom in the kitchen sink to wash all your pots and pans with. It removes sticky substances much more easily than a cloth and makes it unnecessary to put your hands in water during the process.

When oilcloth is dull and shows signs of wear it will be greatly improved by a thin coat of varnish.

If your iron sticks, rub it on brown paper that has been previously rubbed with yellow soap.

Your starch will not stick if you stir it with a wax candle directly it is made.

When blacking a kitchen range mix the blacklead with vinegar, if you want it to have a really good polish.

Select lamp wicks which are soft and loosely woven. Soak them in vinegar, and dry in a cool oven before using.

Paint under window and glass may be easily removed by rubbing with a cloth wet in hot, strong vinegar.

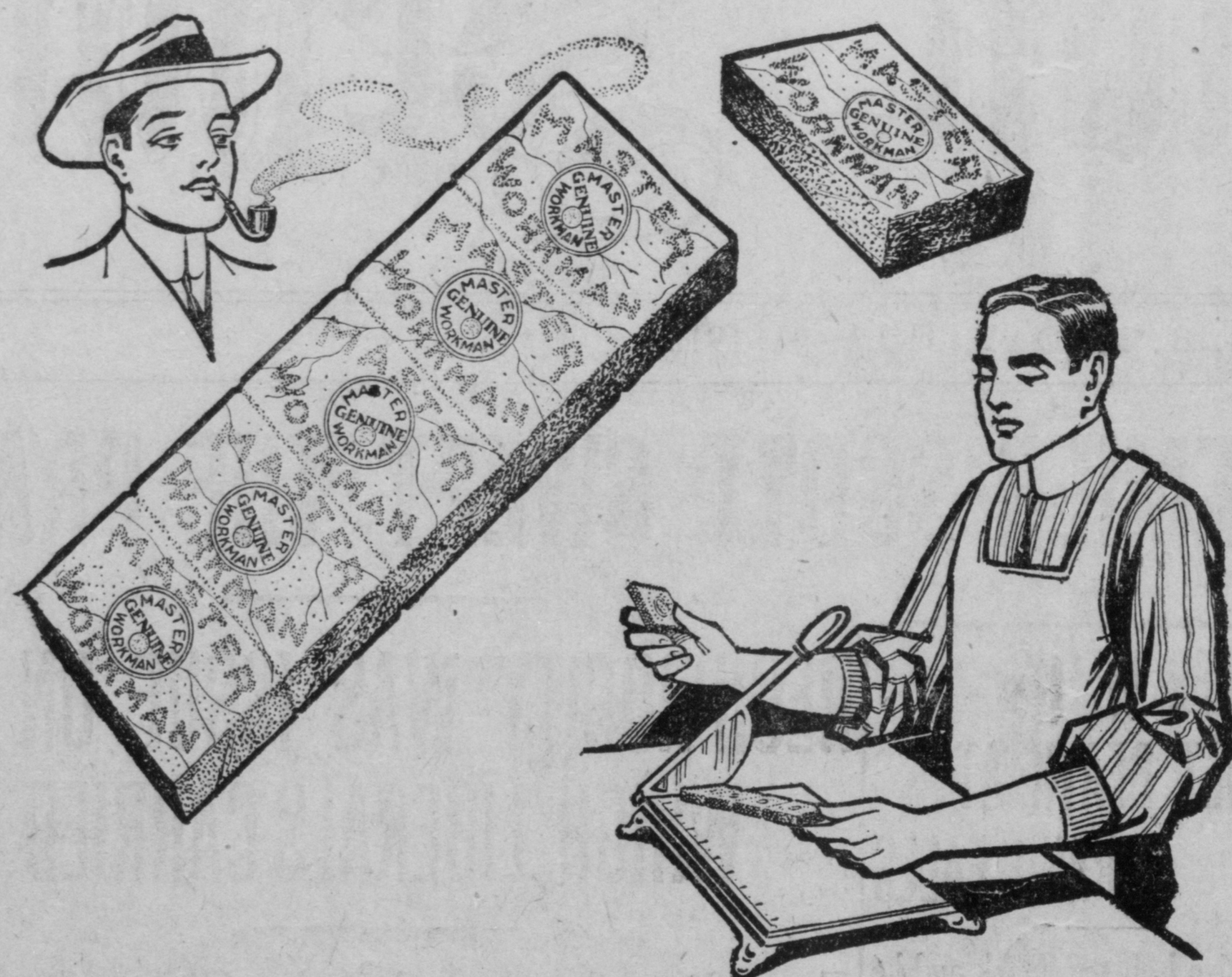

The trustees of the Carleton County L. P. Fisher Memorial Hospital herewith present their annual report. A careful perusal will show the vast amount of good which has been done for the alleviating of human suffering and also show the hard work which has been performed by most of the members of the board.

The Hospital was started in 1903 in the building corner of Broadway and Union streets and occupied until Dec. 1st, 1911, when it was removed to the present magnificent building, head of Main street, the former home of the late Louis Peter Fisher. This building is on the highest point of land in Woodstock and commands a view of the St. John River for miles. It is surrounded by ten acres of land with beautiful shade trees and orchard, and laid out in beautiful walks and drives and at this season the most beautiful bloom of hundreds of choice roses and other flowering plants selected by the late Mrs. Fisher makes it one of the most beautiful spots in Canada.

When the first work of instituting a hospital was started the late Dr. Hand and the writer were a committee to wait upon Mr. Fisher. He advised us about and aided us with our work and gave us to understand that he wished his then home to be a refuge for the afflicted and his will shows how nobly he carried it out adding the sum of ten thousand dollars as an endowment. The generosity of the public enabled the board to acquire a surplus of funds which they have entirely spent upon the reconstruction of the new hospital leaving us in debt to the amount of nearly one thousand dollars. The increased cost of fuel and other necessities makes it more expensive to carry on the work, and the board feels that in order to make it successful they must have increased funds.

All of this Board of Directors belong to the town with one noble exception, Carleton County's grand old man Ex-Warden Leonard Cronkrite, who unsolicited sent us one hundred dollars.

I have in my mind yet five in town, five in the parish, six in Northampton, five in Hartland, five in Centerville, five in Lakeville, as many each in Aberdeen, Simonds, Wakefield, Peel and the other parishes.
