A LIBERAL SWEEP.

Fighting the entire Tory party, Hon. Walter Scott has carried Saskatchewan, by an immense majority, after one of the greatest political battles in the history of the Dominion.

Two cabinet ministers, Mr. Roche and "Bob" Rogers were sent by Mr. Borden to take personal charge of the campaign. Political crooks were impounded by Rogers, money galore was put up by the big interests and the whole Dominion Tory Machine brought into play all the methods made familiar last September, to rob the province of its opportunities and Mr. Scott not only triumphed, but triumphed more completely than many Liberals anticipated.

Premier Scott fought the battle of reciprocity over again and the result puts on record undisputedly that the trade question is, and will be, the big question in Canada.

The country, especially the West, must have larger markets. As Mr. Beer, the retiring chairman of the Toronto Branch of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, said, "no amount of specious argument or flag-waving will allay the feeling or satisfy the West that it has not been robbed." This, coming from an Eastern manufacturer, one of those whom the West, not always with justice, regards as its natural enemies, is significant.

Commenting on the election the Montreal Herald says:

"Saskatchewan has, at any rate, declared its opinion emphatically, and it is for Mr. Borden to answer its just demands. The country cannot be ruled in one interest against the welfare of its most increasingly important population. If the preponderance of voters in Ontario renders Reciprocity impossible, there must be found some other effective way of satisfying the just demand of the West. When Reciprocity was defeated no problem was solved, but a grave and difficult problem was accentuated. Mr. Borden and the majority of Canadians refuted Sir Wilfrid Laurier's solution. What have they to offer in its place?"

APPLE GROWING.

The opportunities for apple growing in New Brunswick are much larger and more inviting than many of the people realize.

The possibilities of the Pacific slope have been demonstrated most successfully in apple culture. The possibilities are just as great on the Atlantic slope. Orchards given the same attention here that they receive in the West will not suffer by comparison, and, so far as real quality is concerned, eastern grown fruit

is superior to that of the Western country.

In this province there are hundreds of acres of land of a quality second to none in the world for the growing of apples, which can be bought at a very low price, for the simple reason that the owners are not alive to the possibilities, or not in a position to take advantage of them.

There is no need of irrigation which has to be resorted to in some sections of the West where apples are made a leading crop. The apple tree is hardy and is not injured by the long hard winters.

All of the natural conditions are right. The only thing needed is intelligent culture and a proper recognition of the demands of the modern market.

St. John Globe:—The election in the Province of Saskatchewan is a triumph for Mr. Scott, whose strength and power as a leader have been again demonstrated in a severe conflict. More than this, it is a triumph of a notable kind for the principles of free trade. It is quite true that there was no question directly of tariff in the contest, but all the free trade leaders of the province worked together, and they demonstrated their strength by the result. The lesson taught should have, and probably will have, an influence upon eastern Liberals and ought to teach them that they must not sacrifice their Liberalism for the sake of the fellowship of a few men who use them or to gain the support of those whose ideas upon tariff are practical and absolutely protectionist ideas.

It surely must be timely now to discuss hot weather topics. There is the soda fountain with its call to the thirsty. It has become an established institution, it is patronized by the high and the low; its devotees are legion. Which means that it is an important factor in the every day life of the country. It is an agent of good or ill, as the health laws, the force of those laws, and the natural inclination of the owner combine to make it. For the sake of the public health it is essential that nothing but the purest concoctions should be dispensed over the marble slab. Pure fruit syrups and the sparkling water will have no ill effects. But when the art of the adulterator enters in, beware. Then is danger lurking about.

The province of Saskatchewan which was almost swept clean by the Liberals on Thursday will send more members to the federal parliament at the next election than New Brunswick and P. E. Island combined.—Mail.

FRIGHTFUL ACCIDENT
NEAR CHICAGO

Thirteen Killed and Many Injured in Train Wreck

Thirteen persons were killed and fifteen to twenty were injured in a wreck on the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy Railway at Western Springs, a suburb of Chicago, Sunday morning. Coming through a fog with supposedly a clear track ahead, train No. 5, a fast mail, ran at full speed into the rear of train No. 2, known as the Overland express from Denver which was standing on the track telescoping two of the Overland Pullman cars. The dead are: Francis A. Barclay, 20 years old, Billings Mo.; George Bronson, 55 years old, Galesburg, Ill.; Virgin No. 8; G. Bunch, 30 years old, Chicago, negro porter, Pullman No. 2; Mrs. G. M. Hart, wife of a physician at Canton, Ohio; Mrs. E. G. Pohlmann, San Francisco; M. E. Stern, 40 years old, Chicago; G. W. Tudor, 40 years old, Lacey Iowa; Miss Lillian Kelly, aged 22, Boise, Idaho; two unidentified women two unidentified girls and one unidentified body. The engine of No. 8 derailed through the rear coach, halting

ing it, and crushing out the lives of helpless passengers in their berths. Many victims, pinioned down by the heavy timbers and iron, as fire in the wreck approached, pleaded for death. The fire department of Western Springs and La Grange put out the fire. Ghouls are believed to have robbed the dead before they reached the morgue in La Grange. Mrs. Wilcox, who was in charge of the switch tower, said: "After thinking the whole affair over I have decided that I was not in any way to blame for the accident. I know that the blocks were set against the train. It was not I that erred."
