

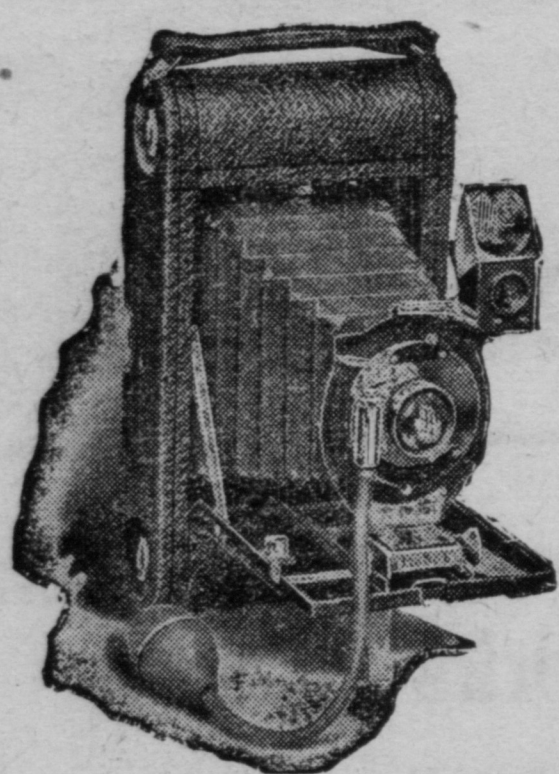

## CONCERT OF THE JUNIOR CHORAL

The Hayden-Gibson theatre held a good audience last Wednesday evening to hear the first concert of Mrs. Adney's class of children. Those who have heard many excellent concerts in Woodstock express the opinion that it is doubtful if anything in the way of chorus singing has ever surpassed that of those very small children who filled 125 chairs and by their intense earnestness and precision and the sweet tone of their voices made a profound impression on the audience. The concert opened with an exhibition of class exercises, taken in one and two breaths for voice control, Mrs. Adney explaining at the same time to the audience her methods of class teaching, the class at once proceeding to the Soldiers' Chorus from the opera "Faust" under the direction of Mr. Tappan Adney. Excepting the fine melody the choruses were all the same as were sung by the Choral Society at their concert in May.

## CANADA'S NAVAL POLICY UNCERTAIN

The Proposal for Voice in Foreign Policy of the Empire Which Borden Government Will Probably Make, Was Turned Down at the Last Imperial Conference

OTTAWA, June 13—Hon. C. J. Doherty, Minister of Justice, will be the Quebec representative at the conference of the Canadian Ministers with the Admiralty in London next month, and Hon. Louis Philippe Pelletier, Postmaster General, will also be hovering discreetly in the offing with advice and admonition to Premier Borden as to the Quebec Nationalist feeling about the navy. Both Mr. Doherty and Mr. Pelletier will accompany the Premier and the Minister of Marine and Naval Affairs to England on the 26th. inst.

### HON. MR. DOHERTY SELECTED.

When Premier Borden announced a few weeks ago that he and Mr. Hazen would go to England and consult the imperial authorities on naval and other matters, he said that "a third Minister" would be selected to join them in the naval conference. Mr. "officially present," though, as has Doherty is to be the third Minister been said, Mr. Pelletier will also "happen to be in London at the same time later on. If Hon. Robert Rogers finds that the Saskatchewan elections are either over or postponed he will also take a trip across the Atlantic on immigration and other business connected with his department.

### CANADA'S POLICY.

The selection of Mr. Doherty as the third Canadian Minister at the Admiralty conference to determine the basis of Canada's naval policy, emphasizes the accuracy of the prediction that the creation of a Canadian navy in co-operation with the Imperial fleet will be made conditional on Canada's representation, or an Imperial Council entrusted with the issues of war and peace or other matters touching the interests of the Dominion in connection with Britain's foreign policy. Mr. Doherty has gone even further than Premier Borden in laying down this principle as a basic condition. Speaking in the Commons in March of 1910 on the naval issue, Mr. Doherty deliberately expressed and emphasized the opinion that "the finding of a way by which we may have a voice, and a real voice in the control of the foreign policy of the Empire is, an essential condition to our embarking upon any permanent policy of participating in the maintenance of naval forces."

### TURNED DOWN BEFORE.

The real mission of the Government representatives to England is not to work out the details of a navy for Canada. It is to propose a scheme of an Imperial Council representative of all the component parts of the Empire. This question cannot be settled definitely at the conference. It is a vital Imperial question, which will require long and careful consideration by all the Overseas Dominions, as well as by the Imperial Government.

And it is worth noting that Premier Asquith at the last Imperial Conference deliberately turned down a proposal of this nature made by the Premier of New Zealand, Sir Joseph Ward. The authority of the Government of the United Kingdom in such grave matters at the condition of foreign policy, said Mr. Asquith, "the maintenance of peace or the declaration of war negotiations necessarily of the most delicate character, cannot be shared and the co-existence side by side of this proposed body would in our opinion be absolutely fatal to the present system of responsible Government."

Under all the circumstances, it is a safe guess, that there will be little really tangible, resulting from the coming conference, and a practical Canadian naval policy under the present Government will continue to be kept "under consideration."
