Some young ladies and gentlemen of this place drove to Hartland Sunday.

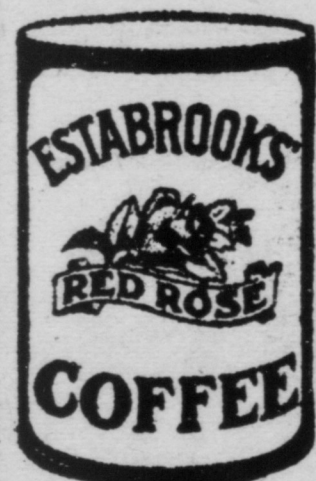
### Notice of Dissolution.
