PORTRAIT OF THE LATE JAMES MCCOY

To Be Placed in The Fisher Memorial School

Great Scholar, Kindly Teacher and Worthy Man Remembered By His Old Pupils—"Old Boys" All Interested

For some time past there has existed a desire, on the part of the pupils of the late James McCoy, to have placed in the Fisher Memorial School, a portrait of their old teacher, who, for many years was principal of the Carleton County Grammar School under the old School Law; and later became principal of the High School of this county under the Free Schools' Act which came into effect in this province in 1872. The idea of getting a portrait of Mr. McCoy was so heartily approved by the "old boys" both far and near, that steps were taken to carry out the plan. An excellent likeness—life-size, hand finished and suitably framed, has been secured, and it is proposed to present this to the Board of Trustees at the first public meeting in the Assembly Hall of the Fisher Memorial School. Those who wish to share in this presentation are asked to send their contributions towards cost of portrait, either to Sheriff Tompkins or C. L. S. Raymond, at as early a date as possible. It is suggested that further subscriptions should not exceed one dollar each, as the greater part of the amount required is already subscribed, and the idea is, not to secure large subscriptions, but that all Mr. McCoy's old pupils, who may wish to do so, should share in this memorial to so great a scholar, so kindly a teacher, so worthy a man. All the "old boys" interested in this matter are asked to meet at the office of A. B. Connell, Esq., on Friday evening, 29th inst., at 7.30. This will afford an opportunity to examine the portrait, to receive the report of committee, and to arrange further details.

Comment on The Hochelaga Vote

Montreal, Nov. 20—Interesting press comment, more particularly with reference to the hearing of yesterday's election in Hochelaga division on the Nationalists position, was forthcoming today. Le Canada regards the return of Hon. Louis Coderre by a majority of 2206 as an indication that "The Nationalists are completely powerless to influence the direction of the political affairs of this country. It is the crushing of Nationalists in an electoral division where they pretended that their support gave the majority to the Conservative candidate on September 21st, 1911." The Herald says: "Neither Mr. Coderre nor the government was sharply challenged for any direct issue raised. In fact the action of many Liberals in voting for the government candidate robbed his majority of its significance as it might have possessed, had there been a contest between the parties."

Coderre's Majority, As Expected Is Very Large

Montreal, Nov. 19—Hon. Louis Coderre, the recently appointed secretary of state in the Borden government, was returned by his constituency today with the decisive majority of 2,206 over his opponent Louis Doyon, the choice of the Nationalist-Labor combine. In fact so meagre was the support given to the opponent of the Borden government that his cash deposit was sacrificed, he having failed by ninety votes to poll the necessary minimum. Henry Post was a recent visitor in St. John.

THE AMERICAN POTATO MARKET

NEW YORK. (Produce News.) Maine seed men are quoting Cob-bler seed \$2.65 and \$2.75 and Green-bay \$2.40 and \$2.50, delivered in New York territory, which includes Long Island, Jersey and nearby points, which take the 35c. rate. These prices rule on goods for March delivery and Maine reports show that quite a number of contracts are being closed on that basis. Southern growers who have the benefit of water transportation via Norfolk, are 30c or less, are contracting steadily on this basis. Florida growers are also in this market. The potato market has taken a big jump, showing an advance of 12c. over last week. Carlot shipments delivered Boston are quoted 68c, with prospects of higher prices. The outside buying demand is splendid and dealers have no men able to keep up the pace. Said one prominent broker: "I can now sit in my office instead of going around 'pulling door bells' and sell everything in sight to waiting customers. The rot in York State and Michigan and our car shortage has boosted prices."
