LOCAL AND GENERAL

Coal still continues scarce in town and dealers are unable to get any shipments in spite of their efforts.

The 67th Regt. Band has accepted an invitation from the officers of the Houlton militia to put on a concert and ball in Houlton, next Wednesday evening.

The arbitrators in the case of Hector Faulkner, of Bellville, versus the St. John and Quebec Railway in a question of land damages—awarded Faulkner \$380. It took three sessions of the board to settle the matter and much evidence was taken. The railway, through its land experts, offered \$40. for the damage to the property, which was subsequently raised to \$80. The owner refused these offers and arbitrators were appointed to settle the question, with the result as stated. Mr. Faulkner's interests were looked after by F. B. Carvell, M. P., while Mr. J. C. Hartley acted for the railway.

The strike of the C. P. R. freight handlers has reached its third week. On this division the most serious trouble seems to be at St. Stephen. A message to the St. John Standard, Monday, says: "Merchants and manufacturers are compelled to handle their own freight at the sheds and to search many cars and piles of freight to find what belongs to them. Freight shipped at St. John ten days ago has not yet reached the merchants here nor can they get any trace of it and the manufacturers can only get freight out by sending men from their factories to load the cars. Ganong Bros. are experiencing much difficulty and are arranging to ship from Calais over the Maine Central to Portland and thence via the Grand Trunk to Montreal. Some hotels and restaurants have refused to feed or house the young fellows sent here as strike breakers from St. John and they were forced to seek lodging in Calais. Boys have gathered at the station when the 6.25 p.m. train is being made ready and use ancient eggs on the two St. John lads who are loading baggage, but no passengers have been interfered with."
