

THE NE TEMERE MAY BE REFERRED TO THE COURTS

Borden Government May Adopt This Course as a Means of Escaping an Awkward Situation

Ottawa, Ont., Jan. 24.—To determine the constitutional aspects of the case and the relative powers of the federal and provincial authorities, it is quite probable that a reference will be made to the courts of the question of the Marriage Law, involved in the agitation over the decree Ne Temere. This proposal may emanate from the government when the discussion arises possibly on Monday, upon Mr. Lancaster's Marriage Bill. This measure declares any marriage to be valid in Canada when performed by an authorized person regardless of his religious faith, or that of the contracting parties. While not saying so in so many words, the bill really is designed to render ineffective the decree of the See of Rome in relation to the marriage of its adherents by ministers of other religion beyond the pale of that faith. It is a Dominion enactment that is proposed. Sir Allen Aylesworth when minister of Justice, held that marriage under the B. N. A. Act came exclusively within provincial jurisdiction. There is reason to believe that Hon. Mr. Doherty's view coincides with that of his predecessor.

Three Ways to Cook Round Steak

For this savory brown stew cut one pound of lean round steak into inch cubes. Put two ounces of suet in a stewpan, shake it over the fire until it is partially melted, and remove the crackling. Dust the meat with a tablespoonful of flour, throw it into the hot fat and shake until each piece is seared, then add another tablespoonful of flour and one pint of stock or water; stir until boiling, and add a teaspoonful of kitchen bouquet, a teaspoonful of salt, a slice of onion and a dash of pepper. Cover the stewpan and push it over a very slow fire to stew gently for one hour. Put half a pint of flour in a bowl, add a saltspoon of salt and two level teaspoonfuls of baking powder. Mix and add sufficient milk to moisten. Roll this dough quickly into balls the size of a walnut, drop them over the top of the stew, cover the kettle, and stew slowly for twelve minutes. Dish the dumplings around the edge of the plate, put the stew in the middle, dust it with chopped parsley.

STUFFED ROUND STEAK.

Take a round steak an inch and a half in thickness and pound. Sprinkle it well with salt and pepper. Make a plain bread dressing, spread it over the steak, roll it up, tie closely and put it in a frying with a little water and a lump of butter the size of an egg. Cover closely and allow to boil slowly one hour, then let brown in the pan, basting frequently. When done, dredge a little flour into the gravy and pour over the meat. Serve in slices.

ROASTED ROUND STEAK.

Make a mixture of buttered crumbs a tomato minced and pepper and salt. Spread this mixture over a round steak and roll this up as you would a sheet of music, first skewering it and tying it securely with stout twine. Lay in a roasting pan, sprinkle over and around it a few minced vegetables—such as carrots, a turnip, some peas and string beans—add a cupful of well seasoned stock cover closely and roast, allowing twenty minutes to the pound. When done transfer the meat to a platter, remove the strings, but not the skewers, and keep the meat hot while you thicken the gravy left in the pan, using brown flour for this purpose. Pour over the steak and send to the table.

FATHER VAUGHAN SCORES NEW DANCES

COMES OUT STRONGLY AGAINST VICIOUS MOTIONS OF TURKEY TROT AND APACHE AFFAIRS.

New York, January 20.—Speaking to a big audience among whom were many society women in the Brooklyn Academy of Music, Rev. Father Vaughan, the noted English Jesuit preacher, expressed strong views against the society craze for such dances as the "apache" and the "turkey trot."

"If proper dancing is all the world over a recognized and exhilarating pastime, he said, "improper dancing, on the contrary, is a practice that is intoxicating, and, therefore ought to be ostracized from every decent vaudeville and still more from every private drawing room."

"To any one with even the most elementary knowledge of physiology, it is apparent that the movements in the so-called dances of the 'apaches' character can result in nothing but injury to righteousness or even decency. Men and women do not happen to be icicles or sleighs; nor are they automata or gramophones. Not even are they oysters or jelly fish. They are human beings, and, unlike asbestos, are very susceptible to fire."

"The so-called dances bearing very suspicious names are forces calculated to awaken animal passion and to set youth on fire, and it is quite impossible to consider what sort of a patent fire engine could extinguish such unkindled flames either in this world or the world to come. It would not be a bad plan to have the hose ready to play on people who dare to defy the public conscience by indulging in vicious movements whose tendencies are recognized to be so injurious to civic morality that those responsible for the decency and welfare of our great cities have felt themselves compelled to prohibit such criminal practices in halls licensed for dancing."

TWENTY-FIVE CENT APPLES

FRUITS THAT SELL IN BIG MARKETS AT \$4.50 TO \$20 A BUSHEL

There are lots of stories told of how apples sell in the big cities for 10 cents and 15 cents each, and even 25 cents each. But most of us have waited to be shown. These prices sound impossible to the man who gets only 40 cents a bushel for his crop.

There's no doubt about it, though. If you go to any of the big cities, like New York, and go through the downtown streets, you pass a hundred fruit stores where apples are offered for such prices—with plenty of persons buying them, too. When you get real homesick and apple hungry we wouldn't be at all surprised if you too, would fork over your dime or your quarter for one of the big red fellows.

On investigation it is found that most of these high priced apples come from the Northwest—from California, Colorado, Idaho, Montana, Oregon and Washington. They're mostly the same old varieties, however, that we grow here in this section.

Yet the East is the natural apple country. Those fine looking Western apples lack the flavor of the Eastern hillside product. The trick of getting the high prices seems to lie, more than in anything else, in offering perfect fruit. It must be flawless in shape and color, free from blemishes, and must be graded carefully. A great deal of capital is made of the attractive boxes, labels, etc., used in packing these western apples.

Apples grown in the West are coarse dry and pulpy, even though highly colored and big. Eastern big apples are fine, delectable and juicy; and if they are grown right, that is, if the trees are of the right varieties for the situation, are properly pruned, sprayed and fed, and the fruit thinned, the apples will be highly colored fine and flawless inside and out. If the people in this section would only wake up to what is possible on their own farms, they could produce apples that will be worth a quarter a piece to the appreciative city folks who want highly colored fruit without a spot or a blemish.

We have received a sample of Nero apples, from Harrison, Berlin Md, that is just as fine outside as any apples that ever came across the Rocky Mountains, while inside it has western apples beat "three thousand miles" in taste and color, and texture. We wish some of those fellows who have farms around here with good soil and good apple locations would eat one like this. It would show them what is required to command the dimes and quarters of the city folks along after Christmas, and we believe it would arouse new ambitions for making the old farm a wonderful money making machine. While Nero is adapted particularly to sections south of New York, other varieties suitable to our conditions will grow just as fine here. Yellow Transparent, Duchess, Wealthy, Red Astrachan, Snow, Hubbardston, Wolf River, Baldwin, Stark, Spitzenburg, the two Greengolds, King, Spy, Rome Beauty and Winter Banana, are the kinds our most successful Apple Growers now plant. When it is remembered that the average wholesale price received for fine fruit, such as this, is more than \$1.50 a bushel and that from 400 to 800 bushels will grow on an acre of ten year old trees, we lean toward the conclusion that few other businesses have equal possibilities.

AN EXPLODED CURE

It is true that when a frozen member is brought into the house the use of snow or tap water relieves the pain by reducing the speed with which the blood finds its ways into frozen and injured vesicles. But in very opposite is necessarily the effect in below zero conditions out of doors. Thawing snow gives forth cold. Ice cream is produced by snow or ice being thawed by means of salt thus creating freezing conditions. If the snow applied melts on the body through the heat of the body it creates freezing conditions about it and can only aggravate frost-bite. If the conditions are so cold as to cause hard snow to be rubbed upon the in-
