

CONSPIRACY TO DEFEAT THE ENDS OF JUSTICE

Tory Magistrate's Conduct in Winnipeg Will Come Before the Court of Appeal—Starting Aftermath of The Macdonald Election

WINNIPEG, Oct. 19.—For the first time in the history of Canada permission to bring up a Magistrate for trial is asked for and that is in Winnipeg. W. H. Trueman of the legal firm of Trueman and Bonmar this morning entered an application in the Court of Appeal to bring up Magistrate McMicken for trial for conspiracy to defeat the ends of justice. The case will be heard next Friday morning in the Court of Appeal before the full bench, six days notice being required. Notice together with several affidavits was served on the Magistrate at the Provincial Police Court.

Magistrate McMicken has been for several years past a henchman of the Roblin Government, and has fallen into line in many political cases which have been started in his court which is directly under control of the Provincial Government.

The case upon which the latest development is based is that of two Conservative personators who were arrested in St. James on Saturday last. The case was scheduled to be tried on Wednesday at 11 o'clock, but when the two prosecutors—Hugh Mackenzie, barrister and R. H. McDonald, who is prominent in local political circles—appeared with their counsel to go on with the case they were informed by Magistrate McMicken that the case was already completed and the men had pleaded guilty and were fined.

Affidavits which have been presented in the case, which it is now sought to have tried against the Magistrate go to show that the Magistrate conducted the cases secretly before the hour appointed at which time witnesses had been subpoenaed to appear; that he lied stating that Arthur Sullivan, barrister, appeared for the prosecution, a statement being produced by Sullivan saying that he appeared only for the defense and that he only tried to get the accused off; that Magistrate McMicken passed illegal sentence, the law calling for a sentence in jail while he only imposed a fine; that he used the name of the Deity profanely during the proceedings when Trueman, the counsel for the prosecution, entered a protest, and that he spoke in most insulting terms to Mr. Trueman who is a prominent member of the Manitoba Bar.

All this will be considered in the Court of Appeal next Friday. The case has created a great stir in the city. At the same time the prosecution of the Magistrate is only regarded as a stroke at the powers higher up.

At the same time several actions are daily expected to crop up as a sequel to the Macdonald election. The Sifton, Wilkins and Prince who were arrested during the course of the election and later released and discharged after a trial in open court, not a shred of evidence being produced against one of the three, will now seek for damages for false arrest. Another case of interest which is to be tried is that of the Magistrate holding these men on bailable offenses without allowing them the privilege of bail or consulting their counsel.

There was not a great crowd at the Court House on Wednesday, when the Sheriff met to count the returns and declare the candidates elect.

Objections were filed, by both parties, to certain returns, on account of informalities connected therewith; these were noted by the Sheriff and the court proceeded until the return from Simonds was reached, when it was found that the Returning Officer had failed to attach his name thereto. J. N. W. Winslow, on behalf of Messrs. Connell and Diblee protested against counting the vote cast in Simonds, on the ground among other things that whereas there were only 134 names on the voters' list, 149 ballots had been cast. Mr. Connell contended that the Sheriff should ignore entirely the Simonds returns; Mr. Jones argued that the Sheriff had the right to call upon the Returning Officer to amend his return. The Sheriff took the latter view, and adjourned his court till Thursday at 3 p.m.

OBITUARY

JOHN L. BRICKNELL

John L. Bricknell was born in Halifax, N. S. and died in Mars Hill, Maine, October, 2, 1912 at the age of fifty two years and eleven months. He is survived by a wife, mother, four brothers and three sisters. He was the son of staunch Presbyterian parents and received his early religious training in that church. His parents moved to Glassville, N. B., while he was a small boy and his young manhood was spent there with the exception of three years spent in Pennsylvania.

August 28, 1892, he was married to Miss Jessie Hume of Lakeville, N. B. and the following spring came with his wife to Aroostook County, Maine, and bought a farm which he owned at the time of his death, near the village of Mars Hill.

Mr. Bricknell, naturally strong and robust, began to fail in health some over a year ago, but was able to be about until a few weeks before his death. These last weeks were filled with suffering and weariness, but through it all his trust in God was clear and he would often say, "His grace is sufficient for me."

He joined the M. E. Church of Mars Hill, August 18, 1895 and was elected an official the same year and continued serving faithfully as steward and later as trustee to the last. He was always ready to do all that lay in his power for the church and its pastor. He was truly the pastor's right hand man and more than once he shouldered his axe and tramped to the forest to cut timber or wood for the church or parsonage. Though he was childless, his home was open to the fatherless and more than one can thank God for the shelter of that home and the kindness of "Uncle Jack."

He was a member of several fraternal organizations, viz. I. O. O. F., K. of P. and Sisterhood, Foresters and Maccabees and the Grange and was held in high esteem as was witnessed by the beautiful floral tributes and the presence of many who were present and participated in the burial service conducted by the I. O. O. F.

Funeral services were conducted by the pastor, Rev. F. Ernest Smith assisted by Rev. W. H. Dunham of Bridgewater, a former pastor, October 5 at the Mars Hill M. E. Church. Floral tributes were many and most exquisite. Interment was at Williamstown cemetery, N. B.

Mr. Bricknell will long be missed by the people of Mars Hill and especially by the church he so faithfully sustained.

A WORK-BOX TABLE

The dimensions of this work box table are thirty four by twenty two inches, and it is thirty inches in height. It can be made of pine, shellacked inside, and stained mahogany outside. The top of the table is on hinges, and inside are various divisions in which are kept buttons, thread, tape and braid. The lid shuts down, and makes a convenient and attractive flat-topped table.

SOME GOOD COOKIES

Ginger Snaps—Heat one cupful of molasses to the boiling point, and pour into bowl over one-half cupful of shortening (butter and lard in equal proportions). Mix and sift three and one-fourth cupfuls of flour, one tablespoonful of ginger, one and one-half teaspoonfuls of salt, and one-half teaspoonful of soda. Add to first mixture, and chill thoroughly. Toss one-fourth on a floured board, and pat and roll very thin; shape with a small round cutter first dipped in flour. Place near together on a buttered sheet and bake in a moderate oven.

Vanilla Wafers—Cream one-third cupful of shortening (using butter and lard in equal proportions) and add one cupful of sugar gradually, while beating constantly; then add one egg, well beaten, one-fourth cupful of milk, two teaspoonfuls of vanilla and two cupfuls of flour mixed and sifted with two teaspoonfuls of baking powder and one-half teaspoonful of salt. Roll, shape and bake the same as ginger snaps.

HINTS FOR HOUSEKEEPERS
