TWENTY YEARS AGO

From the Sentinel
August 20th, 1892

The steamer Florenceville is again on the route. His Lordship Bishop Sweeney, of St. John, visited Woodstock last week and was the guest of Rev. Father Chapman. While here he administered the Sacrament of Confirmation to a large class of adults and children.

Mrs. Robt. Stephenson met with a serious accident on Sunday evening, by being tipped out of a carriage, near Mr. Jerry Wolhaupter's, Richmond. Notwithstanding she received a severe cut on the head, some three inches long and quite deep, with remarkable nerve Mrs. Stephenson refused to be treated away from home, but pressing a lap robe to the wound to stay the flow of blood, she was brought to her home in Woodstock, where Dr. Colter rendered the necessary surgical aid.

In the matter of Canadian Pacific Railway vs. Hon. P. G. Ryan, Chief Commissioner of Public Works, et al. Mr. C. W. Weldon, Q. C., appears for the plaintiffs and Hon. Attorney General Blair and Hon. Solicitor General Pugsley for defendants. Mr. Weldon applied this morning for an injunction order to restrain defendants in their writ from proceeding with their works at Woodstock. The government is building a bridge across the St. John river at Woodstock. Since the railway has been built it has run over and across King street of Woodstock by means of a bridge. The new bridge across the river comes near this place, and they are building retaining walls for a roadway from bridge preparatory to raising the road so that it will be level with the railroad. The plaintiffs contend that defendants must get permission before they can interfere with the railway. The government contend that they have a perfect right, as does also the coun-

Ottawa, Aug. 14—The remnant of the public service commission which is left, consisting of Mr. Ducharme and several minor officials and experts have returned from a tour of investigation in the maritime provinces, and, it is stated, "Have disbanded for a vacation." It is, however, rumored on good authority that the results of the investigation so far have been most disappointing and that the anticipated scandals which were expected to be brought to the light of the day have not materialized.
