Saturday night Sirois was arrested by Officer A. R. Foster on complaint of William Hallett and was admitted to bail.

Sirois was again arrested on a warrant issued by Justice John Barnett charging him with obtaining money from Sydney Merrithew by falsely pretending that he was Dr. Cleveland. Mr. Barnett refused bail and the prisoner was remanded to Woodstock jail until Saturday next.
