BOSTON BAKED BEANS.

Pick over and wash three cupfuls of small white beans; cover with cold water and soak over night. In the morning put them on the stove, just to scald, not boil, in the same water. Pour off the water and put into an earthen beanpot. Add several teaspoonfuls of sugar, one teaspoonful of salt, one half pound of salt pork, fat and lean mixed. Cover with water, and bake from 8 a. m. until 6 p. m. As the water boils away add more.

CRUSHING AND SQUEEZING OUT THE SMALL FARMER

A writer in the Canadian Courier observes that the last ten years has been a period of mergers in the farming world of Ontario, and that the farm of 100 acres has rapidly passed out of sight in that province. Now, he claims, the average farm ranges from 200 to 300 acres. This development is of interest to New Brunswick farmers. It suggests that the same laws may be at work in the evolution of the farming industry as in other industries. Large farms, where the land is adapted to the employment of machinery, can, no doubt, be worked more economically than small farms; large farms also have decided advantages, in the matter of marketing their products.

Will there be a good period of mergers in the farming world of New Brunswick? One of the conditions of the operation of large farms is cheap labor, and the immigration policy of the local government is bringing in cheap labor from the agricultural communities of the mother country. And though Mr. Hubbard may talk about the great possibilities of the intensive farming of a few acres, the exigencies of competition in a restricted market gives the large farmer an advantage which, combined with his power of securing cheap labor will enable him to crowd out his small rival and absorb his land. Large farms or a general system of co-operation will be needed to enable New Brunswick to compete successfully with Ontario in the home markets.

The possibility of the evolution of the farming industry in this province following the same course as in Ontario presents a social problem of considerable importance. It is doubtful if there are 10,000,000 acres of arable land in New Brunswick. That means that there is room in the province for about 32,000 farms of 300 acres. According to the census of 1901 there were 35,297 owners of farms in the province, 1,255 tenants, and 931 owners and tenants—a total of 37,583 farms. Were farms of 300 acres to become the rule in this province, it would mean a reduction of the number of people enjoying the dignity and comfort of free-hold proprietorship.

Probably farming on a great scale carried on with the skill and appliances which large capital can command and methodize, will yield greater results than the tillage of the soil in small homesteads. But there are more important things than the production of the greatest quantity of farm produce at the cheapest rate. We should be wary of encouraging the system of large farming because it is bound to deprive multitudes of the opportunity to acquire homes and independence, and may entail the evils of land-lordism—the whole brood of mischief with which monopoly has scourged the people of every age. Yet our governments are encouraging the evolution of the system of large farming; the provincial government by importing cheap labor, the Federal government by withholding from our farmers the opportunity of securing larger markets. If New Brunswick farm produce had a market in the big cities on the American seaboard, there is no doubt that both the immigration policy and the ready-made farm scheme would work out to the advantage of the province; though the ready-made farm scheme would be unfair in some particulars, as it should be supplemented by a policy enabling all farmers to command the use of money on the same terms as the ready-made farms were sold. But under present conditions it is doubtful if they do not do more harm than good.

Mr. Hazen repeatedly stated that the object of his immigration policy was to place farmers from the Old Country upon the uncultivated lands of the province; Mr. Flemming's ready-made farm scheme is an effective commentary upon the failure of the immigrants brought out during

the past three years at considerable expense to take up lands on their own account. The immigrants are not taking up farms, because the small farmer has little chance of successfully competing in a restricted market. Mr. Flemming may bonus a few immigrants to take up farms, but in so doing he merely increases the difficulties of the native farmers who have to compete against the subsidized settlers in a restricted market. One hundred thousand dollars will only provide ready-made farms for a few, and the great percentage of the immigrants merely furnish cheap labor for the large farmers who are thus enabled to crowd out the small farmer. Reports from different sections of the province state that more people are abandoning their farms this spring than for some years past.
