The weather during the week has been exceptionally cold for March; the roads were never in better condition than now.

Mr. Isaiah Lockhart, one of our well known citizens passed away on Monday evening after a few weeks illness. His remains were interred in the Methodist graveyard, on Wednesday.

There is an immense accumulation of hemlock bark at the railway station here, and it is being shipped to the United States as rapidly as possible. Mr. James Carr is the principal shipper. At the shipping stations between here and McAdam there is similar activity in the bark trade which in the aggregate represents a large amount of money and the employment of much labor men and teams.

A serious fire occurred at Florenceville station, Tuesday night. The fire was first discovered in the potato house owned by S. J. Watson, Houlton; the alarm soon brought the inhabitants to the scene but they were powerless to check the flames. The flames spread to the flower shed of G. W. White & Son, and to the hay shed of H. McCain and thence to four cars standing on the siding all of which were speedily consumed. The origin of the fire is not known. There was no insurance and the losses are estimated—S. J. Watson \$1000; G. W. White & Son, \$500; H. McCain, \$1,500.

OCEAN LIMITED EARLY ON ROUTE

Summer Time Change on Intercolonial Railway June 2nd

The summer change of time on the Intercolonial Railway will go into effect on June 2nd, when the famous Ocean Limited will be placed on the route between Montreal, St. John, N. B., and Halifax, N. S., with connections for and from the Sydney and Prince Edward Island in anticipation of an early rush of summer travel.

The time schedule is expected to be practically the same as last year which means that the "Limited" will leave Montreal at 7.30 p. m., reaching Levis at midnight, and giving through passengers the opportunity of seeing the famed Matapedia Valley during the earlier hours of the morning and a view of the Restigouche River and the blue waters of the Baie des Chaleurs. The beautiful valley of Wentworth, N. S., will be seen in the more mellowing light of early evening, and the train will reach Truro at 8.00 o'clock connecting with the through night express for the Sydney and arriving at Halifax at 10.00 p. m.

The Maritime Express under the summer schedule will leave Montreal at 8.15 a. m. and through passengers will have the daylight journey through Quebec, and a view of the majestic St. Lawrence as it widens in its course to the sea, making connection at Moncton with morning express for St. John the Maritime continuing eastward will reach Halifax at 13.30.

The Ocean Limited will leave Halifax westbound at 8.00 a. m., and the Maritime Express will leave as usual at 15.10 thus there will be a through week day service by two trains equal to the best on the continent

QUERIES ABOUT THE VALLEY ROAD

Ottawa, March 13.—The question of constructing the Valley Railroad from St. John to Grand Falls is causing the government some concern. It is not yet clear that the federal government will approve of the whole route.

Some time ago Hon. Mr. Cochrane stated that the route had been approved from St. John to Centreville, but not beyond.

Today Mr. Michaud asked: "Does the government intend to grant a subsidy to assist in the construction of the St. John Valley Railroad to Grand Falls?"

The answer of the government was: "A subsidy was granted in 1910 for a line of railway from Grand Falls to St. John."

Mr. Michaud asked if the government will "require that the contract be signed so that the railway will be built to Grand Falls before any subsidy is granted to help out any portion of the railway."

The answer of the government was: "Any subsidy granted by the governor general in council must be in accordance with the terms of the subsidy act."

This answer is taken as an indication of the willingness of the government to arrange for a portion of the line and to let the rest go.

THE AUDITOR GENERAL

The Flemming government is endeavoring to make a scapegoat of the auditor general. In an effort to explain why the opposition cannot get particulars of public works expenditures, the Standard this morning says:—

"Without in any way consulting the government, the auditor general has apparently made a change in his method of reporting on these expenditures. As implied in the public accounts committee last year it was the wish of the government that a full and complete statement of all the items expended by the structural superintendents should be made public. The chief commissioner stated that he had nothing to conceal, that the accounts were all sworn to and that if it could be shown that perjury had been committed the offenders would be dealt with in the proper manner. Instead of giving all the details as suggested by the chief commissioner, the auditor general furnishes even fewer particulars of the money spent by structural superintendents than he gave last year."

Could anything more mean and cowardly be imagined than this attempt of a government to save itself by denouncing one of its own officials? Not content with disregarding the provisions of the audit act, which was framed for the alleged purpose of protecting the public funds, this government stoops to make an attack upon the auditor general. For we must assume that the Standard is speaking for the government.—Times-Star.

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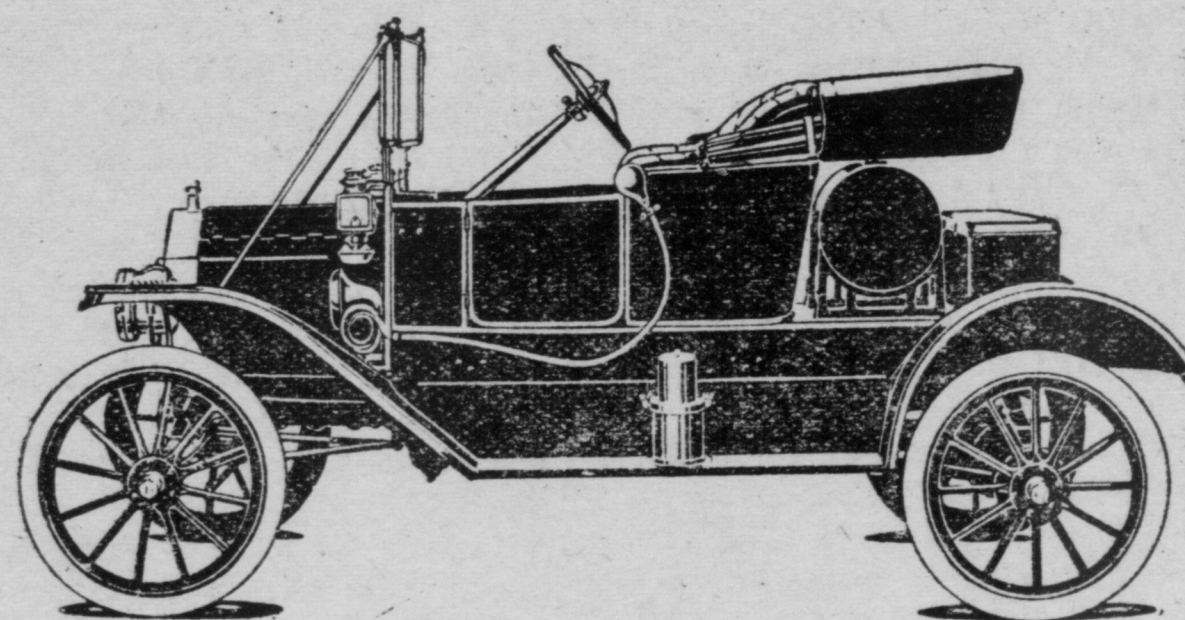
