## TOWN FATHERS HOLD LENGTHY SESSION

Listen to Report on Permanent Streets—The New Fire Alarm—Improvements Promised on Sidewalks—Gates to be Placed at King Street Crossing?—Report of Town Treasurer.

The town fathers were in session Monday night, all being present but Sewer Dept. Coun. Jones, who was out of town. A large batch of bills were presented and handed to the Audit Committee. Mr. Gosling, Supt. of permanent street construction, made a lengthy report of the operations up till August 1st, showing the total amount expended for permanent work to be \$1619.57. This includes crushed rock, sufficient to complete the work. 2895 square feet had been built from Connor street to Savage's stable. After some discussion the report was ordered placed on file. Coun. Gibson in reply to a question said the new fire alarm was being placed in position and would soon be in operation. Some delay was caused by necessary changes required to strengthen the tower in which the striker is placed. At noon of each day the bell will sound five times. In case of fire the number of the box will be sounded. The public will be notified through the papers as to how the system will be carried out, as soon as the work of installation is finished. Payment of men on town work twice a month was approved by the Council. Coun. Dibblee presented the request of the Woodworking Company for a sewer near their factory. It was decided to put in the sewer at a cost of \$60.00. The sidewalks came up for discussion and Mayor Ketchum strongly recommended that repairs be made in places where on account of holes it was becoming dangerous. Coun. Gallagher of the street committee, denounced the habit of using so much water on the sidewalks which was the cause of many of the defects. He said repairs would be made at once. Coun. Dibblee dwelt earnestly on the deplorable condition of the sidewalk on Connell St., and made a most touching appeal on behalf of the residents of that street, for improvements. Coun. Gallagher evidently much impressed by the condition of affairs, as portrayed by Coun. Dibblee, promised to look into the matter at the earliest opportunity. Mr. W. E. Stone addressed the council on behalf of the band and his efforts were rewarded by a vote of \$100. to be paid at once on account of previous appropriation for band concerts. The question of working the town horses was placed in the hands of the chairman of the street and fire departments, they to have sole authority in the matter. ## NEW BISHOPS FOR ANTIGONISH AND ST. JOHN

Very Rev. James Morrison to Succeed the Late Bishop Cameron—Rev. Father LeBlanc Appointed Successor to Bishop Casey of St. John, Who Has Been Transferred to Vancouver.

Three important changes have been announced to take place immediately in the Catholic Church in the Maritime Provinces. Very Rev. Jas. Morrison, D. S., V. G., Vernon River, P. E. I., has been appointed Bishop of Antigonish, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of the late Bishop Cameron; Bishop Casey of St. John has been appointed Archbishop of Vancouver to succeed Archbishop McNeil, who has been appointed to the diocese of Charlottetown. Rev. Father LeBlanc, a native of Digby County, Toronto, and has been at St. Bernard's for a number of years. Previous to being appointed to St. Bernard's he was stationed at Salmon River, having gone there from the parish of Caledonia and Liverpool. He is a graduate of Church Point College and also attended the Seminary at Halifax. Rev. Father LeBlanc has many friends in Halifax who will be pleased to hear of his appointment.
