THE EAST IS GOOD ENOUGH.

Many people have been lured from the East as a result of lavish advertising and booming on the part of the people of the West. It is said that Vancouver is over run by people in search of work. Many of these came from eastern provinces without means to establish themselves after their arrival, and the result is they are a burden to the community in which they are located.

There are opportunities in the West, as there are in all parts of the country, but to take advantage of them a certain amount of capital is needed. The man who strikes the West with nothing but his hands today will find that he has his hands full to take care of himself, and his family, if he has a family.

And while many are still going to the West, it has been discovered that a section of the East, which a few years ago men were so anxious to leave, is a pretty good section in which to live, and there are opportunities here that were not dreamed of by many who rushed to the West in search of better things. The advantages of New Brunswick as an agricultural and fruit growing region are beginning to command the recognition they deserve, and there are many opportunities more inviting than are to be found in many portions of the West.

New Brunswick is a good country. Its climate is good. The soil responds to proper cultivation. It is the natural home of the apple and with care apples can be grown here as well as any place on the face of the earth. Land is cheap for those who want it. There are no hard times as in the West, and all that is required is an honest effort and success is sure to follow.

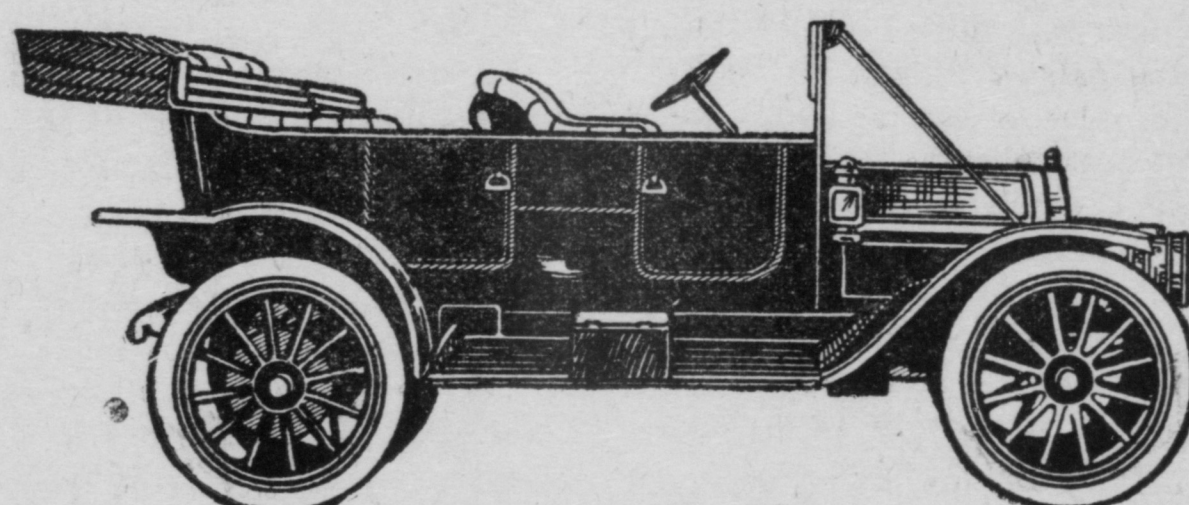
