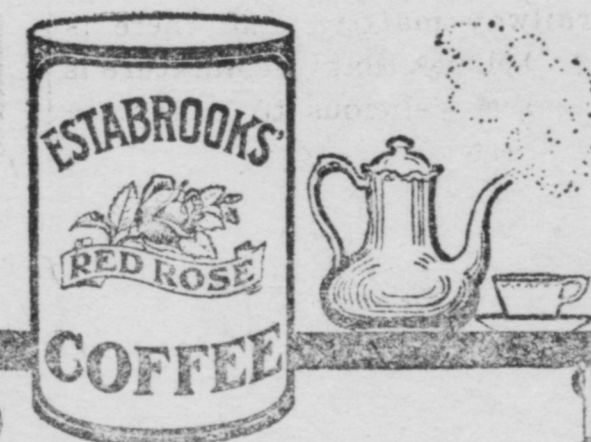
Mr. Avard White who has been attending a technical school at Halifax, N. S., arrived home on Monday night having passed his examinations successfully and received his certificate.
