BOY SHOT THROUGH THE HEART

Shocking Accident at Tilley,
Victoria County

Andover, N. B., July 26—A shocking fatality occurred at Tilley, near here, on Thursday when Gordon, the twelve year old son of Joseph Paris, died from a bullet wound in the heart received from the rifle of a companion.

The accident happened about noon Thursday. Young Paris together with a couple of companions of about his own age were playing near his home in Tilley. One of the lads, Ernest Morrill, had a rifle; the gun exploded and the bullet struck the Paris boy near the heart, killing him almost instantly.

Coroner Beveridge held an inquest on Thursday evening and a verdict of accidental death was returned by the jury.
