

### Mr. Crocket's Protest

Mr. F. B. Carvell, M.P., for Carle ton, in a speech in parliament a few days ago, protested against the character of the work being done by the contractors for the St. John Valley Railway. He pointed out that the company which has the contract to build the road is to receive government subsidies and bond guarantees to the amount of \$31,400 per mile, whereas they are constructing a road which he thinks will not cost them more than \$25,000 a mile. Mr Carvell figures it out that the pany will make a clear profit of \$750,000 on the proposition. Mr. Carvell in support of his statement, was able to quote the following letter by Mr. O. S. Crocket, M.P., to the deputy minister of railways:

Fredericton, N.B., July 11, 1912 A. W. Campbell, C. .. Deputy Minister of Railways and Canals, Ottawa:

Construction is now proceeding on St. John and Quebec Railway location, which has been condemned by dominion inspecting engineer. 
#### Mr. Carvell Here-
