

14,000,000 BUSHEL POTATOES SHIPPED FROM AROOSTOOK CO.

Good Prices Being Paid With Prospect of Holding Up Damage to Southern Crop

(Houlton Times)
The indications are that the potato growers of Aroostook county will plant about the same number of acres to potatoes this spring as they did last, with the additional natural increase that comes every season. This increase is due to the amount of clearing that is carried on in the county and the general extension of the potato growing business. Outside of that there will be but little change in the situation.

The market for potatoes in Aroostook county has been particularly strong for this time of the year during the past few weeks or so and good prices are being paid. A man conversant with the situation here said Saturday that it looked as though the price would hold up well towards the very last of the season, and that the farmers are particularly pleased over the prospect.

It was the general impression last

fall that the potatoes would close in the spring at a low price, but word comes that there has been a serious damage to the early potato crop in the Carolinas and Virginia and in the south, which all tends to help out the Maine potato growers. The later the southern potatoes are in arriving on the market, the better it is for Aroostook county.

Farmers in Aroostook county have shipped out over 14,000,000 bushels of potatoes from the county this year and it is estimated that there remains unshipped about three-quarters of a million bushels. The estimated crop for the past season was about 15,000,000 bushels.

Few potatoes are being moved at the present time as the farmers are busy getting their lands ready for planting, so are not hauling many. Those that are being shipped are going mainly from the potato houses where they have been in storage.

Just Something About Eggs

The egg constitutes a perfect food in itself, containing in the proper proportions all the food element essential to life. The white is nearly all protein, being made up of four separate albumens. The yolk, besides protein, contains 20 per cent. of fats. Phosphorus and sulphur occur in both yolk and white. The egg is easily digestible as well as nutritious. Old ideas regarding digestibility of eggs cooked in various ways seem to be pretty well upset by recent investigation. Where the digestive organs are healthy, raw eggs are digested in about two hours, soft boiled in three, and hard boiled

in from three and a half to four hours. It will thus be seen that eggs in any form are comparatively easy of digestion, and the hard-boiled egg is as digestible as the soft-boiled one if it is thoroughly masticated. An improvement on the old method of quick boiling of eggs is to drop them into a large receptacle of boiling water, not over a fire, and allow them to stand for ten minutes. If the taste is for hard-boiled, the eggs should be boiled for one hour or three quarters of an hour longer than the white will be found tender and the yolk dry and mealy. In all forms, eggs are a most nourishing and digestible concentrated food, and if cheaper might easily take the place of meat to a very large degree. In a country like New Brunswick there is infinite room for expansion in their production as all the conditions are favorable a little more intelligent care and a little more enterprise being all that is needed.

Household Suggestions

HOUSEHOLD NOTES.

Coffee stains may be removed from table linen by rubbing with pure glycerine then washing in luke warm water.

In papering bedrooms it is a good, safe general rule to choose light papers with scarcely any design at all upon them.

Curtains will hang straight if a small lead weight is fastened in the lower corners. For silk curtains use a weighted braid.

Cayenne pepper is excellent to rid cupboards of mice. The floor should be gone over carefully, and each nole stopped up with a piece of rag dipped in water and then in cayenne pepper.

If great care is not taken flat irons easily become rusted. The following is a good way to clean them when this occurs. Tie a lump of beeswax in a piece of rag, and when the irons are hot rub them with this. Then rub them well with salt on a cloth, and they will be quite smooth and clean.

Montreal, May 26—A special despatch to the Herald from St. Catharines says: That a Dominion election next fall is anticipated in government circles at Ottawa is shown by advice to this effect which were received on Saturday by leading Conservative workers in St. Catharines, who are warned by Organizer Birmingham to get busy on the voters' lists, as indications all point to a contest before winter. Whether this notice has been sent out as a general order all over the Dominion, or whether it is due to the fact that the Liberals thus far have the only candidate, is not known here, but it is being taken as an official order to get on the campaign armor.

Selling Potatoes to Yankees

Ald. W. W. Boyce of Fredericton, who is the largest exporter of farm produce in York county, during last week shipped eleven carloads of potatoes to the Boston market. The price paid for them to the farmers was seventy cents a barrel, which, with customs charges of seventy-five cents, brings the total up to \$1.40, the price now being paid by shippers in Aroostook county.

Alderman Boyce expresses the opinion that the Underwood tariff bill would give a great stimulus to potato growing in this province. "I tried to tell the people that two years ago when the reciprocity issue was before the country," he said "but they would not listen to me. Now we are going to get access to the United States market but the whole world will share it with us. Had reciprocity carried we would have had a cinch."

TO WHITE CLOTHES.

Handkerchiefs and white clothes that have become yellow may be whitened in the following simple manner: After they have been washed in the usual way, lay them to soak overnight in clear water, into which cream of tartar has been put. A teaspoonful to a quart of water is the right proportion. When ironed they will be as white as snow.

DUSTLESS DUSTERS.

CANNED STRAWBERRIES
