PUBLICITY COMMITTEE PLANNING BIG CAMPAIGN

The Board of Trade Deals With Many Matters of Importance—Much Interest Manifested in the Discussion of the Town's Welfare—Railway Comes in for Sharp Criticism

A well attended meeting of the Board of Trade was held in the town hall, Wednesday night. After the minutes of the last meeting had been read, Mr. E. W. Jarvis addressed the board on the question of location of St. John and Quebec Railway—the question coming up from the resolutions of the Gagetown Board of Trade. Mr. Jarvis said it seemed very difficult to obtain any reliable information on the subject, and the railway officials informed him that no definite location had as yet been decided upon. He moved the following resolution—seconded by Mr. George Balmain:

"Whereas it has come to the notice of this, Woodstock Board of Trade, that a movement is on foot to divert the proposed route of the St. John and Quebec Railway, below Gagetown, from the East to the West side of the St. John River, and

Whereas it is absolutely necessary to the benefit of the country served by the said Railway that it shall follow the shortest route to St. John consistent with reasonable grades, and

Whereas it is possible that the judgment of some agitators for the new route may be influenced by their desire for a bridge across St. John harbour,

Resolved that, while, at the present stage of surveys and estimates, this Board recognises that there is not yet sufficient available information to enable it to pass judgment on the respective merits of the two routes and it does not attempt to do so: In the opinion of this Board the selection of any but the most economical route from the standpoint of traffic would be highly detrimental to the efficiency of the Railway and to the interests of the whole Province and that no section of the Province will have more cause in the future to regret it than will the City of St. John, if the efficiency of this Railway, as a through line, is sacrificed in the least degree for the sake of local improvements in that City or for any other cause."

The Committee appointed to meet with the Agricultural Society in reference to grounds not being ready to report the time was extended.

The membership committee reported a very successful canvass of the town and in nearly every case they met a cordial response from the citizens. Twenty five new members were added to the membership and they felt confident that their efforts would be crowned with still greater success when the work was completed.

Mr. Jarvis spoke of the possibilities from the farming point of view and said we were undoubtedly in the centre of one of the richest farming districts in Canada. The farms were good and could be made to produce three times as much as they now do. Business will not grow by spreading itself. He strongly urged encouragement to farmers in order to make them realize what opportunities they had.

Mr. E. W. Jarvis of the publicity committee was not in a position to say what action would be taken in reference to publicity until it was known what money would be available for the purpose. If the committee had five hundred dollars they could start a campaign in earnest. Pending the arrangement of the financial end he would ask for further time in which to report.

Supt. Harshaw of the C. P. R. said the gates at King street were under construction. The delay was (Continued on page five)

KNIGHTSPYTHIAS ENTERTAIN

Ivanhoe Lodge No. 7
Celebrates 49th Anniversary of Founding of Order

A Delightful Musical Program—Interesting and Instructive Addresses

The 49th Anniversary of the founding of the order of Knights of Pythias was fittingly celebrated Wednesday evening by Ivanhoe Lodge, No. 7, at Castle Hall, Main street. A large number of invited guests and visiting brothers were present and a splendid program was carried out for their entertainment. At 10.30 a dainty lunch was served, after which interesting speeches were delivered by members of the lodge and others present.

Chairman Wm. Balmain in his address of welcome to the guests and visiting brothers gave a very interesting account of the founding of the order and the principles for which it stands. The first lodge was opened in Washington D. C. in 1864. In that year the total membership in America was 75, while today there are 7801 lodges with a total membership of 710,636, of which 10,388 belong in Canada, 2,317 in New Brunswick. He referred to the friendship that existed between Damon and Pythias, and it is upon this that the order is founded.

Mr. Thos. Noddin delivered an interesting address in his usual eloquent manner. He said he thought it the duty of every citizen to become a member of some secret organization. Secret societies had built up this country and made it what it is today, the best in the world. A man is no good unless he helps his fellow man. The Knight of Pythias was founded on Friendship and men by following its teachings were made better and stronger. All christian secret societies aim to help the weak and uplift mankind. He noticed in every town and city that the very best men were members of the different orders, although the Knights appealed to him as being above them all. Mr. Noddin was warmly applauded as he took his seat.

Interesting and instructive addresses were made by Messrs. H. D. Stevens, J. Scott, Elbridge Haines, L. E. Young, T. Strong and others.

THE TOWN COUNCIL GETS DOWN TO BUSINESS

Financial Budget Higher Than Last Year by \$4,000.00—Heads of Departments Ask for More Money

Animated Discussion on Appointment of Deputy Clerk—Bijou Theatre and Other Picture Shows Must Pay Increased Licenses—Vaudeville Subject to Criticism

TABLED—APPOINTMENT OF REVISORS

The Town Council met in special session Monday night, with all present but Coun. Burden who was absent through illness. J. C. Hartley, clerk, being absent, J. P. Malaney acted in his place.

Coun. Lindsay said that owing to the absence of the clerk, from many meetings of the Board, he thought it necessary that a deputy clerk should be appointed and he would move that J. P. Malaney be appointed.

Coun. Dibblee—What salary is attached to the office?

Coun. Jones—If Mr. Malaney works for the town he should be paid.

Mr. Malaney was heard and said he had been doing this work and the records would show his handwriting for years back. He did it to oblige Mr. Hartley and was quite surprised at the motion to make him deputy clerk.

Coun. Jones—If it is in order he would suggest that Mr. Malaney get the salary paid Mr. Hartley, when filling the position.

Coun. Dibblee—If Mr. Malaney acts pro tem council should not object. We pay the town clerk and if the Council is not satisfied with Mr. Hartley's services he should be notified. Don't think Council has any right to vote salary. It was up to Mr. Hartley to make arrangement.

Coun. Balmain—If this Council appoints Mr. Malaney, deputy clerk, we must pay him—we have no right to cut off Mr. Hartley's pay. If Mr. Malaney is willing to do the work and Mr. Hartley makes the arrangement he should provide the pay. If the Council appoints a deputy clerk the Council must pay him.

Coun. Lindsay—was sorry he was the innocent cause of all this discussion. He thought it only a graceful act to appoint Mr. Malaney. Often times we are without a clerk and it is very embarrassing. With the consent of the seconder he would withdraw his motion.

Coun. Gallagher—If Mr. Hartley wants Mr. Malaney to act he should pay him. He could see no harm in making the appointment—as seconder of the motion he agreed to withdraw.

Coun. Lindsay moved that the old revisors J. H. Stairs and Stephen Green be reappointed. Carried.

Coun. Jones presented a petition from C. Hanson asking for extension.

sion of water system to his house. Supt. Fields in reply to the question said the work would entail a cost of \$1100. The petition was laid on the table.

Coun. Balmain moved that the Clerk be authorized to draft a bill to amend the by-law in relation to liens on real estate and that taxes be first lien. Carried.

Coun. Dibblee spoke of the vaudeville put on at a moving picture house which he said was represented to him as being indecent. He thought it time for the authorities to take some action to stop such exhibitions if allowed to continue where will it end?

Couns. Lindsay and Jones had seen nothing objectionable. If anyone finds fault a complaint should be made to proper authorities. Had often seen worse shows than that of Saturday night.

A discussion took place on the question of licenses for shows and resulted in a motion by Coun. Lindsay that picture houses pay \$20. a month license—this is to apply to the Bijou. Carried.

The financial budget for the year was taken under consideration, and the amount, as compared to last year, to carry on the affairs of the town, is higher.

The Water and Light Department ask for \$1000 more than last year—or \$8,500 in all. The streets get \$5,000 divided \$3000 for permanent and \$2000 ordinary. The fire department gets \$300 more and police \$200. The assessment ordered is \$44,000. There is an increase in the estimated receipts.
