caused by being unable to secure material. He also said the railway wanted more freight and would be glad to see industries coming to town. Inducements would have to be offered to get these industries. He would suggest liberal loans for a number of years under certain conditions.

At this point a lively discussion took place over the excessive freight rates to Woodstock.

Mr. Jarvis said reasonable freight rates were indispensable in a town's interest.

Mr. Harshaw said the railway was disposed always to give every one a square deal. He said the N. B. branches were not paying and said there was expended on these branches in 1908, \$450,000; 1910, \$400,000; 1911, \$372,000; 1912, \$340,000. There was always a deficiency and it was hard to get concessions under such conditions.

Mr. Howard Burr, who has just returned from the West, told of the excellent service of the C. P. R., and was sorry conditions are not so here. If the present rates on wood and coal continue it simply means he will have to go out of business. Mr. Burr gave a very lucid account of the freight conditions as applied to Woodstock and felt that something should be done to remedy the matter.

Mr. George Balmain said that Woodstock was better today than in its history, as had been intimated, industries had failed—the failure was owing to lack of management and perhaps lack of capital. He felt the railway matter of freight rates would soon be adjusted by competition, when the new railway was completed. The successful man is the man who turns out good goods and puts them on the market in the right way. We have granted assistance to industries and have legislation to do so now to any reliable concern.

Mr. James Gallagher hoped the Board would assist the agricultural society in securing grounds. He felt the society was an industry, especially in view of the fact that they intended expending from \$30,000 to \$35,000 on tracks and buildings.

On motion the publicity committee was instructed to appear before the town council and ask for a grant of two hundred and fifty dollars to help carry on a publicity campaign. Meeting adjourned to meet again March 4th.

OBITUARY

MRS. LUCY ANN PHILLIPS.

On Tuesday morning, February the 18th, there died at the residence of her son, Mr. George Edward Phillips, Victoria Street, Mrs. Lucy Ann Phillips, aged 85 years.

Mrs. Phillips was born at Batley Carr, near Leeds, Yorkshire, Eng., on Nov. 28th, 1827. She came to New Brunswick to live with her son in October, 1904.

Mrs. Phillips was a woman of much culture and of exceptional refinement and nobility of character. She had an unusually well-informed mind, having in her youth, had the advantage of attending some of the excellent old country schools. Her interest in foreign missions, in the work for seamen, and the poor, was aroused in early life, and to the end, she prayed frequently and gave liberally to those and other worthy causes. She was connected through her ancestry with some of the courageous Moravian missionaries, and it was an unceasing source of delight to her to talk of the work of these, and of other Missionary heroes, many of whom she had heard speak and under whose personal influence she had been early brought. She also took a keen interest in legislation the aim of which was the social and moral uplift of the masses. She held decided and pronounced views, and these she expressed with invariable grace and facility. She was a woman naturally greatly beloved, being gentle and beautiful in her life, of unfailing courtesy, of great faith and patience. She rests from her labours and her works do follow her.

Mrs. Phillips was a Congregationalist by religious profession, but since coming to Woodstock she attended and supported the Presbyterian Church. She leaves her son, Mr. George E. Phillips, an only child, and two granddaughters, the Misses Lucy and Martha Phillips.

Interment was in the town Cemetery on Thursday, at 2.30 p. m., Rev. Frank Baird officiating. There were many beautiful floral tributes.

CATHERINE LENEHAN.

Miss Catherine Lenehan, a highly respected woman of this town, possessing many friends, died on Friday night. She had been in failing health for some years. She is survived by two sisters, Miss Julia Lenehan, of Salem, Mass., and Mrs. Nora Donovan of Lynn, Mass., and two brothers Daniel and Thomas living in the States. The funeral took place Tuesday morning from her late residence, Connell street, to St. Gertrude's church, where requiem mass was celebrated by Rev. F. J. McMurray, after which the burial was in the Catholic cemetery.

Mrs. Robert Barker, sister of Mrs. E. W. Williams, of this town, died on Monday, Jan. 9, of acute bronchitis, at Long Beach, Calif. The remains were taken to Great Falls, Mont., for burial.

C., Tuesday, of rheumatism of the heart. Mrs. Anderson was the eldest daughter of the late Hon. Chas. Connell, and was born in Woodstock. She leaves surviving her, two sisters, Mrs. (Colonel) F. H. J. Dibblee, of this town, Mrs. Chas. Garden of Vancouver, and one brother, W. M. Connell, Esq., also of Woodstock. She went to Vancouver in November to visit her sister, Mrs. Garden. A few days ago she went to Victoria to visit a friend and while there died. The remains will probably be taken to Halifax for interment.
