### LINCOLN STORIES

General Grant Wilson, one of the surviving generals of the Civil War, tells a number of interesting Lincoln stories in the New York Independent of February 20th.

General Wilson said that it was in October '58 that he first met Lincoln. At that time, although he had just gone through his historical and unsuccessful contest with Douglas for

a seat in the United States Senate, Lincoln's law office was a little unkempt place over a grocery store. During the conversation Wilson happened to repeat a statement that had been made to him regarding Washington. This was to the effect that Washington had never met his equal in wrestling. Lincoln said that was very much the case with him. He had, he said, been "up against a great many good men but he had found only one that he could not throw, and that one found it impossible to throw Lincoln.

On another occasion, says Wilson, Lincoln was passing through a lunatic asylum, and as the place was chilly and draughty Lincoln wore his coat and hat as a means of protection against the cold. While passing through Lincoln was met by one of the inmates, who asked him how he dared to presume to wear his hat in the presence of Christopher Columbus.

"I beg your pardon, Mr. Columbus," said Lincoln, and passed on. When he was on his way out again he met the same man and was asked how he dared to wear his hat in the presence of General Washington.

"I beg your pardon, General Washington," said Lincoln, "but it seems to me you told me half an hour ago you were Christopher Columbus."

"That is perfectly correct, sir," was the answer, "but that was by another mother."

After Lincoln became President, and while the Civil War was in progress, he was being driven one day to a review of a corps of the Northern army. Some of the roads were very bad and the driver began swearing "like our army in Flanders."

"Driver, my friend," said Lincoln, "are you an Episcopalian?"

"No, I ain't much of anything, Mr. President," was the reply. "If I go to church at all I generally go to the Methodist."

"Excuse me," said the President. "I thought you must be an Episcopalian for you swear just like Seward, and he is a churchwarden."

Seward, who was a member of Lincoln's Cabinet and much given to profane language, was in the party. The reproach of the President was not only for the driver, but for Seward as well, and it is said that after that Seward was much less profane than formerly.

It is further added that although Lincoln as a young man lived in Southern Illinois, where the habit of profanity was almost universal, and where the habit of drinking and using tobacco was equally prevalent, the President himself never swore, never drank and never chewed tobacco.

Lincoln, as people familiar with this great character know, was an exceedingly tall man. It is stated by Wilson that only once did he meet his match in this respect, and that that he met one who was more than his match, being indeed 18 inches taller than himself. For once Lincoln was taken aback, and looked

up to the man taller than himself said: "My friend, will you permit me to ask a question?" "Certainly, Mr. President." "Do you know," asked the President, "when your feet get cold?"

## PREMIER BORDEN'S AMAZING FLOP

(MR. BORDEN, MARCH 29, 1909)  
In so far as my right honorable friend, the Prime Minister, today outlined the lines of naval defence of this country, I am entirely at one with him. I am entirely of the opinion in the first place that the proper line upon which we should proceed in that regard is the line of having a Canadian naval force of our own. I entirely believe in that.

(MR. BORDEN, MARCH 29, 1909)  
I think that an expenditure of money designed for that purpose (local naval defence) ought in the main at least to be under the control of our own Parliament, and that by making an appropriation of this kind and attending to the defence of our own coasts by co-operation and co-ordination with the Imperial naval forces we would be rendering a real service in the defence of the Empire, and we would be doing our duty not only to Canada, but to the Empire as a whole.

(PREMIER BORDEN, DEC. 5, 1912)  
There have been proposals to which I shall no more than allude that we should build up a great naval organization in Canada. In my humble opinion nothing of an efficient character could be built up in this country within a or perhaps half a century.

(PREMIER BORDEN, FEB. 29, 1913)  
If you have the British navy, the most powerful navy in the world, if you co-operate with it, if you assist in maintaining and building it up, I venture to say that you have arrived, for the present at least, at the best solution of this problem that could possibly be devised.
