MEETING OF THE UNITED BAPTIST CHURCHES

Issues and Phases of Religious Subjects Eloquently Discussed—Services Draw Large Congregations—Rev. A. C. Berrie New District President

The seventh annual meeting of the United Baptist churches for District No. 2, was held in the Woodstock church, commencing on Friday evening and continuing over Sunday. The sessions were presided over by Rev. S. W. Schurman of Hartland. The speakers from outside were Dr. DeWolfe of Acadia University, J. D. Spurden of Fredericton, and Miss A. Slipp, who represents the U. B. W. M. Union.

FRIDAY EVENING
At 7.30 there was a song service, which was followed by a practical address on Young People's Work by Rev. James MacLukie of Florenceville.

Rev. A. C. Berrie, having been asked by the Home Mission Board of New Brunswick to present Home Missions gave his address on Friday evening. The address showed that there are 40 Home Mission Fields in the Province, comprising 94 churches

and 166 stations. They have a resident membership of 3617. There are also 73 Bible Schools, with 2375 scholars. The figures being for year ending May 31st, 1912, show that the Home Mission Pastors received an average salary of about \$540.

Surely there will have to be much word done before these pastors will receive \$800, and parsonage. Of the 31 churches in our District to whom allotments were made not one reached the amount asked, unless it was Lakeville, \$4 being contributed. The amount asked not recorded. The churches in the District gave to Home Missions \$390. \$100 of this was given by the late Col. D. McLeod Vince, \$130 by the Woodstock U. B. church, leaving the remaining \$160 to about 1100 resident members, an average of about 15c. Such figures do not indicate generosity. The amount contributed in the District for all purposes would show but an average of \$9.20 per resident member which is certainly less than one half it should be. I am persuaded that the returns for this year ending May 31st, will be much better.

There may be several causes for these small contributions. Lack of training. Lack of vision. Lack of method. Lack of the consecration of

ourselves to God. We should seek remedy. For souls are perishing without Christ as their Saviour. There is blessing in giving and men need the blessing.

The country churches are feeders to the town churches. Many of our best men are from the farm. They need strong religious training in youth that they may be able to meet temptation successfully when they come to town. The Principles as taught by Baptists are in my judgment nearer the old Book than those taught by any other, and its our duty to support the work that pushes forward the Word of God. I urge upon you the importance of being what we profess. If we belong to God all that we have is His also. If we see our brothers need of the gospel, the brothers of these mission fields, and we shut up our bowels of compassion toward them, how dwelleth the Love of God in us? Let us rally our forces, and loose our purse strings, and make this the banner year in our District in Denominational Offerings.

SATURDAY SESSION.
The first item for the morning was an old-time conference meeting led by Rev. J. C. Bleakney, and the appoint

ment of committees took up the time till the noon hour.
After dinner, Rev. C. N. Barton led in a prayer and praise meeting, after which the Women's Missionary Meeting was held.

Sunday morning opened with prayer by Deacon W. Margison of Jacksonville.

At 11 o'clock a very able address was presented to the large congregation by Dr. T. H. DeWolfe of Acadia Seminary. His message was on Acadia, what Acadia is, and what Acadia is doing.
