The N. B. Telephone Company have a crew of men changing over the trunk lines to make a circuit to Edmundston. They commenced work here on Monday.

P. R. conditions. In the meantime, local merchants make complaint of loss of goods, one firm having lost during the week, six boxes of cigars stolen from a case.—St. Stephen Courier.

Mr. George Ackman, who has been acting claims agent of the J. C. R. for several months past, has been confirmed in the position, his appointment dating from September 1, 1912. Prior to his connection with the claims agent department Mr. Ackman was in the engineering department of the railway for twenty years or more, and has been considered one of the best informed and most competent clerks in the service. Since his connection with the claims agent's department Mr. Ackman has made himself thoroughly familiar with the work. His appointment is one well deserved by merit.

Mary J. Sirois has applied for a divorce from James Sirois. The application is made in a Maine court. Revd. V. Jewett, of Calais, is acting for Mrs. Sirois. Several prominent citizens of Hartland have furnished evidence that will very materially assist in obtaining the divorce. It is known that Sirois travelled through the country with a woman, whom he said was his wife and it has since been learned that the pair were at Hartland and other places in this county. It will be remembered that Sirois was tried and convicted last September for obtaining money under false pretenses and received a sentence of five years in the penitentiary.
