LOCAL AND GENERAL

Messrs. Wm. Bell and W. Benjamin Bell, of the Parish of Wakefield, Carleton county, have assigned to Sheriff Tompkins.

The high winds and piercing cold kept many close to their firesides last week. Those who ventured out found the muffs and coats that have been rather irksome to carry, during a large part of the winter, were exceedingly warm and comfortable.

Rev. Edwin Evans, superannuated minister of the "Methodist Church" died at his home at Hampton Station on Friday last. Dr. Evans has occupied important charges in the conference and was highly respected and loved in every community in which he lived.

There were moved by the Bangor & Aroostook Railroad in the month of Jan., 1913, 1,268,611 bushels of potatoes, as compared with 1,434,502 in January, 1912, and a six year average of 1,271,062. The total shipments from August, 1912, to January, 1913, inclusive, were 6,633,573 bushels.

Easter this year falls on March 23, which is the earliest date that it can possibly come in any year. The day is regulated by the Zodiac. Days and nights are of equal length the 21st of March and the first Sunday after the full moon, after the days and nights are equal is always Easter.

The Boy Scouts have been meeting in New York this week, to celebrate the third anniversary of the introduction of the movement in this country. Any boy over twelve years of age may be a member and it is estimated that there are upwards of 300,000 members throughout the United States.

The "scabs" who make Houlton their headquarters seem to have their full share of trouble in town. Several of the merchants have positively refused to sell them goods and boarding houses have refused to shelter them. The railroad has fixed up a freight car where they are enacting their "competent" help.—Houlton Times.

B. branch of the Dominion Alliance is calling a convention to be held in Fredericton during the session, and will wait upon the government and the provincial legislature and present a request for a provincial prohibitory liquor law.

Houlton has already commenced to book attractions for the "Biggest and Best" Fourth of July celebration ever held in Eastern Maine. The new park will be the attraction for some of the fastest horses in the country.

During the cold weather drivers should blanket horses that are left standing on the street. In some places this rule is strictly enforced and horses not properly covered are taken to a stable and the owner pays the bill.

The arbitration cases between Peabody Bros., McBride, Bedell, Kennedy and the St. John and Quebec Railway have been finished. The decisions will be given March 10th, on which date the case of Gallivan versus the railway will also be heard.

Wednesday, Feb. 19th, being the 47th anniversary of the founding of the Order of Knights of Pythias, the members of Ivanhoe Lodge No. 7, beg to announce to all members of the order, past or present, that they will be at home at their Castle hall on that evening. Hartland, N. B., Feb. 2—On Saturday C. P. R. Police Officer Foster arrested Frank and Chris O'Donnell, of Kent, charged with fighting at Perth Station. They were lodged in Andover jail to await a hearing on Monday. Hebert Atkin, another participant, was also arrested and taken before Police Magistrate Holyoke who sentenced him to a month in jail. Liable to Penalty

The Chief of Police has received notification from Secretary H. M. Blair of the Public Works Department that all chauffeurs and motor-cars should have been issued with licenses not later than Jan. 10, and those without licenses for 1913 are liable to penalty under the motor vehicles act. Chauffeurs licenses for the ensuing year are numbered from 301 and upward, those for cars 701 and upward. The number plates are yellow and black instead of red and white as heretofore.
