When making desserts allow one heaping tablespoonful of granulated sugar to each egg and a half a pint of milk.

NEW ENGLAND DOUGHNUTS

Sift a pint and a half of flour, divide it into two parts; makes a hole in the centre of one part, pour in a wine glass of yeast, mix the flour gradually into it, adding warm milk to make soft dough; cover and set by the fire for two hours. To the other part of flour, cut up five ounces of butter and rub fine; add half a pound of powdered sugar, a teaspoonful of powdered cinnamon, a grated nutmeg and a little over half a pint of milk. Beat three eggs very light and throw them into the mixture. When the sponge is light mix all together and set by the fire for one hour. When light, turn on pasteboard and roll, cut in thin cakes any desired shape, and fry brown.

To have boiled potatoes fluffy, pour the water off when they are done, then let them stand in the dish they are cooked in on the back of the stove for a few minutes, giving them an occasional shake.

The falling off in the price of potatoes appears to be due to the fact that the crop last year in the United States and Ontario was much greater than in the previous year, consequently very few are being shipped away. In other words potato growers in New Brunswick this season will have to depend to a considerable extent on the home market which of course means lower prices. The total yield of potatoes in Ontario in 1911 was 13,918,698 bushels whereas in 1912 it was 21,336,394 an increase of 7,415,696. As Ontario is our principle outside market for potatoes there would seem to be some ground for the prediction made by a local shipper that the price will drop to fifty cents per barrel before spring.

Corn cob syrup passes for maple syrup, and is better than the high priced maple you get at the store. Take red ears, clean and sound, and boil in water until it is well colored, then strain, add the sugar to the water in the same proportions you would use for any syrup and boil until of the right consistency.

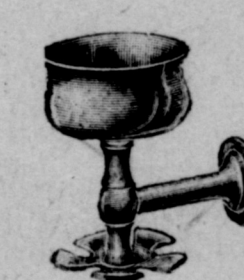

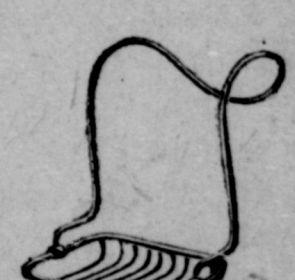
