It is but a few years ago that Gene Stratton-Porter gave to the world "FRECKLES." It proved a tickler to the palate of modern fiction readers, with the result that more than a million have been delighted with its quaint story of the folks of the Lumberlost Swamp country of Indiana. There have been many stories, strong in all intrinsic points which go to make up an absorbing story, but they are of no value to the stage—the action is lacking. "FRECKLES," however, is the reverse. It is stronger as a play than it was as a novel.

The New York producer, A. G. Delamater, has, with considerable trouble, secured all the rights of "Freckles" for the stage. He knows the value of a story from the standpoint of a stage production, and he was quick to see the possibilities of Mrs. Porter's tale of "The Lumberlost." He secured the brilliant dramatist Neil Twomey, the author of several successful plays, among them "Harrington Reynolds," "The Angelus," to dramatise "Freckles," and it will come to the Opera House, Friday, Jan. 31st next. It is the identical New York cast and production.

The dramatist has followed the text of the story in a most faithful manner, and every one of the now familiar characters; "Freckles," "The Swamp Angel," "McLean," "Mrs. Duncan," "Wissner," "Black Jack," and all the rest, will be in the play living, breathing characters. Mr. Delamater has given the play a magnificent scenic investiture and has secured a strong cast of players, in a word it will be up to the regular Delamater calibre. From the standpoint that the play is stronger than the story, it is safe to say that it will be vastly popular. In the short time it was produced last season it proved a triumph from a stage point of view, and it is undoubtedly destined to be one of the most substantial successes of the decade.

A fatal railway accident occurred Monday morning, at Plaster Rock, when an engine and two freight cars of train No. 82 left the rails. Fireman William Muckler was killed and Percy Sisson, the engineer had his arm broken. The accident occurred near Odell River station and was caused by icy rails. The wheels of the locomotive skidded over the icy rails and plunged down the embankment carrying the fireman to his death. Two freight cars were piled cross-wise on the track and turned over. Messages for help were hurriedly sent and a relief train from Perth brought doctors from that town to the scene of the wreck, while an auxiliary crew were also rushed forward. The work of caring for the dead man and attending to the treatment of Engineer Sisson was begun, and the crew set to work in clearing the wreckage, which kindred troubles."
