

HOME RULE BILL WAS PASSED BY A BIG MAJORITY

**Big Demonstration in the Commons
When the Measure Was Carried
—The Vote Was 367 to
257 a Majority of 110
for the Bill**

**Premier Asquith and John Redmond, the Irish
Leader, Were Cheered Lustily—Bill
Read for the First Time in
House of Commons**

LONDON, Jan. 16.—After a long stern battle the Home Rule Bill passed the House of Commons tonight by a majority of 110. It later was read for the first time in the House of Lords. There were two divisions in the Lower House, Mr. Balfour's motion for its rejection was defeated, 258 to 368, while the third reading was carried by a vote of 367 to 257, one member of each side having left the House in the interval. The result of the division was too much a foregone conclusion for a tremendous demonstration, but Irishmen inside and outside of the House did their best, and assisted by the Liberals and Laborites, gave the measure for which they had waited and worked so long a good send off on its way to the House of Lords, where its fate is certainly sealed.

BRILLIANT SPEECHES.

The division was preceded by another series of brilliant speeches by the political leaders, among whom were Frederick E. Smith and the solicitor general, Sir John A. Simon, two of the cleverest among the younger members, and the veterans, John E. Redmond, Timothy Healy and Augustine Birrell, Chief Secretary for Ireland.

HOUSE WAS CROWDED.

The House was crowded throughout the day. The Nationalists were only one short of their full strength, Joseph P. Nannetti being prevented from attending by a paralytic attack which he suffered today. Several of the older Nationalists who were seldom able to attend, came from Ireland for the debate. The Liberals and Laborites too turned out in force and the Unionists were not far below their total membership. The galleries likewise were filled to their capacity those occupying seats including many dignitaries of the Church, and the Bulgarian Peace Plenipotentiaries.

BIG DEMONSTRATION

When the figures were announced, the Nationalists waved hats, handkerchiefs and papers, and cheered lustily for Premier Asquith and Mr. Redmond. The latter, who is usually impassive, was carried away by the enthusiasm of his followers and entered into the spirit of the demonstrations as enthusiastically as they. Those who crowded the lobbies received the figures with another roar of welcome, and followed this by cheering the Bill itself as a copy was carried by an official from the Commons to the Lords. The upper House met especially to receive the measure and formally passed its first reading.

The House of Commons soon quieted after the Irish demonstration, but outside the crowd continued to cheer for some time. A strong force of police prevented any attempt at an organized demonstration, fearing a clash by the opposing factions. The Nationalist songs and cheers brought forth counter cries from the public, who had gathered largely out of curiosity.

An anti-Home Rule demonstration was held in the streets of Belfast tonight, and a copy of the Bill burned amid deafening cheers. Intense excitement prevailed, but there was no disorder. In a characteristic speech during the course of the debate Mr. Redmond spoke feelingly of the years of defeat and discouragement through which Irishmen had passed in their efforts to secure Home Rule, and now this day of victory had arrived.

Oatmeal Gruel.—To three cups of boiling water add one-half cup of coarse oatmeal and one-half teaspoonful of salt. Cook five hours in double boiler. Dilute with hot milk, and strain.

Whey.—Add to one quart of fresh milk, slightly warmed, one tincture tablet dissolved in a little cold water. Two teaspoonfuls of essence of peppermint or two teaspoonfuls of rennet. Strain through cheese-cloth.

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Senator Burleigh Presents Bill

Albert A. Burleigh gave the railroad lobby something to think about early in the session when he got his bill to incorporate the Van Buren Bridge Co. into the hopper as the first piece of new legislation of the session. The measure is evidently intended to assist in the railroad development now going on in the northern end of the county and which is much more extensive than most people imagine. The Bangor & Aroostook has doubtless been worrying considerably over some developments in that section and its monopoly of the business is not certain. While the Burleigh bill is simply to incorporate a bridge company, if passed, it will allow a Canadian railroad to tap the county and furnish a deep seaport less than 200 miles from the potato fields of the county.

The scheme is to build a railroad bridge for the use of steam and electric roads from Van Buren on the American side to St. Leonard's, across the St. John river, on the Canadian side. St. Leonard's is the terminus of the Restigouche & Western railway which has a line of 112 miles to Campbellton, N. B., at tide water on the Bay of Chaleur. The capital stock of the bridge company is placed at \$250,000, and the incorporators named are A. E. Hammond, Harry A. Gagnon, C. L. Cyr, Willis F. Paradis, J. F. Theriault of Van Buren, H. D. Collins of Caribou and A. J. Libby of Fort Fairfield. The company wishes the right to charge toll for the use of the bridge by the railroads and public.—Aroostook Pioneer.
