CHANGES IN THE CABINET SOON

Le Devoir Says Three Ministers Will Resign---Important Positions Will Be Assumed by Hon. Frank Bruno Nantel, Hon. Frank Cochrane and Hon. Dr. Roche

MONTREAL, April 29.—Le Devoir, the newspaper owned and edited by Mr. Henri Bourassa, the Nationalist leader, and which is usually well informed on political affairs, to-day states that Hon. Bruno Nantel, Minister of Inland Revenue; Hon. Frank Cochrane, Minister of Railways, and Hon. Dr. Roche, Minister of the Interior, will resign their portfolios in the Borden cabinet to assume other "important positions." Le Devoir says that Mr. Nantel will become a judge. None of these resignations will take place until the end of the

session. Mr. L. T. Marchal of Montreal, may succeed Mr. Nantel in the inland revenue department.

Le Devoir asserts that though Mr. Cochrane has administered his department well, he is not popular in the House nor among the Conservative members from the counties through which the Intercolonial Railway passes, and says he will be sent to Washington as the agent of the Canadian government. He is likely to be succeeded by Major Currie, member for Simcoe, Ont.

Mr. Roche will resign because of

ill-health and will be sent to the Senate, says Le Devoir. His successor may be Mr. Arthur Meighen, member for Portage La Prairie. Mr. Albert Severyn, of Dorchester, aspires to the position of solicitor general, a position also being sought by Mr. A. C. Boyce, of Albion. Mr. Borden has not decided on an appointment to this office. The prime minister also would like to secure Mr. W. J. Hanna of the Ontario government, but is opposed in this by Sir James Whitney.

SENT BULLET INTO HIS HEAD

Charlottetown, P. E. I., April 29.—The body of William Osler, aged 23, a farm laborer who came to the island three years ago from England was found at the roadside early this morning. He had shot himself through the right temple, with a revolver. He had been forbidden by the parents of a girl with whom he had been keeping company, again to visit her. A letter found alongside the body announced his intention of ending his life.

He asked that all his letters at the home where he had been staying be destroyed and that news of his death be kept from relatives in England. He had written to his mother telling her he intended going west in a few days.

Last night Osler was heard walking along the road singing and apparently quite happy. A few hours later about four o'clock a shot was heard and is now supposed to have been from his revolver.

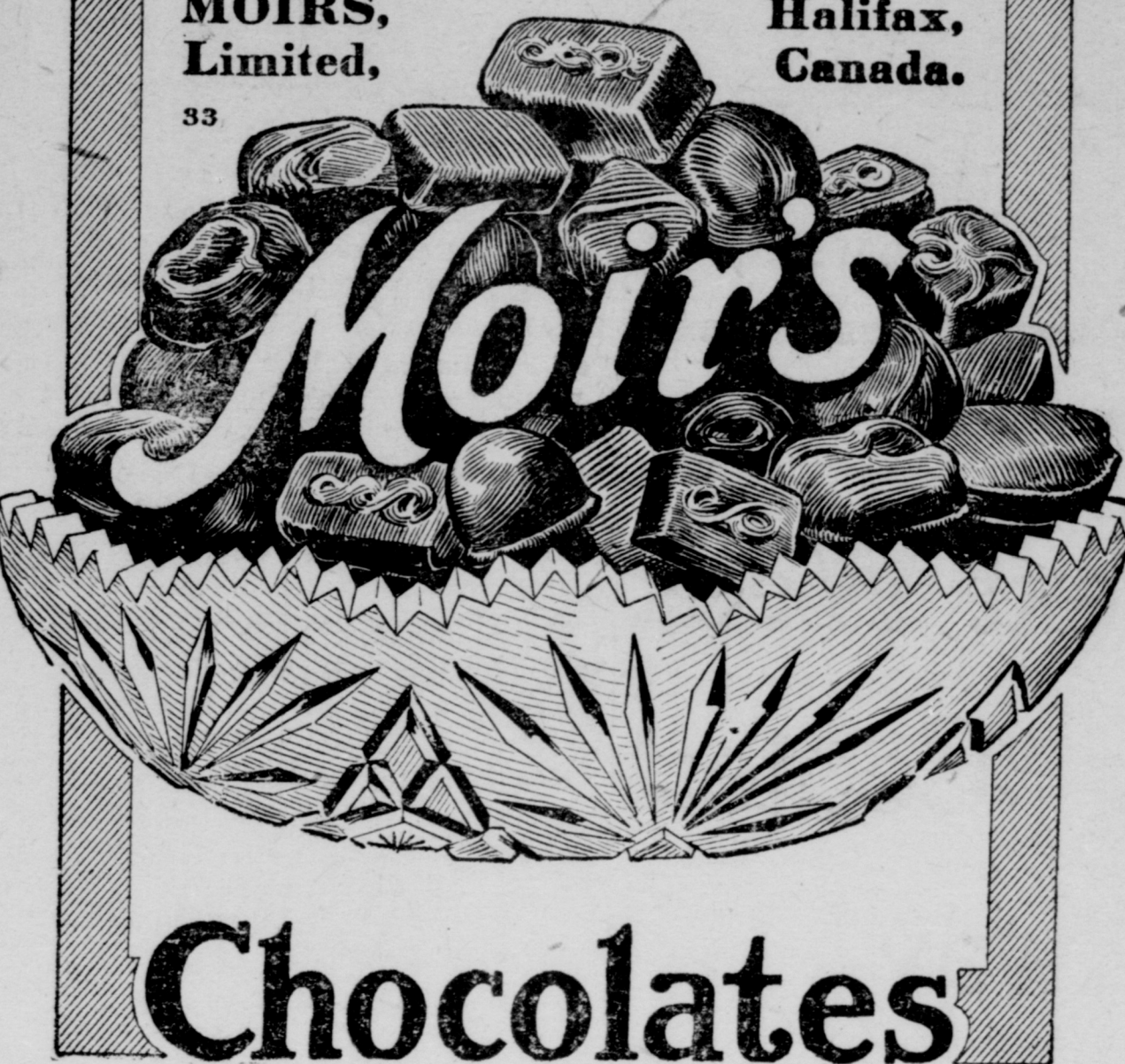
