Twenty-One Dresses for the Royal Bride

Berlin, May 14—Scores of tailors, dressmakers and lacemakers of the express relief at the completion of the greater part of trousseau of Princess Victoria Louise, who is to marry Prince Ernst, of Cumberland, on May 24. There has been a continuous stream of delivery wagons at the palace at Potsdam, and box after box has been delivered and exhibited for the inspection of the empress and the ladies of the court.

The Berlin papers have sought in vain for information as to a description of the bride's trousseau, in regard to which there is much speculation owing to the unusual secrecy which has been observed.

Enquiries made in court circles elicited the somewhat surprising information that the fear of the socialists hangs heavy over the bride's trousseau, and is more or less responsible for the secrecy. It was intimated that the Kaiser and Kaiserin were afraid of the caustic criticisms of the Socialist press as to the cost and quality of the outfit. It is said that the Empress will probably decide during the coming week, in view of the popularity of the princess, to permit the wedding gown and veil to be placed on view for a few days at some place where the public can see it.

Unofficial information received at various shops in regard to the Princess Victoria Louise's trousseau is that it is rich but of simple elegance.

The Princess is said to have twenty-one new gowns. Fourteen of these are tailor made.

The wedding gown is of white satin point applique of conventional cut, with the train four yards long. The cost of the gown and the train, which has been specially hand made and the lace, will not exceed \$1,000. The veil, on which many girls in the Silesian Lace School worked for more than six weeks, cost \$680.

GERMAN EXPERT CRITICIZES THE 'CURE'

GREATEST LIVING AUTHORITY ON TUBERCULAR COMPLAINTS SAYS CANADIANS AND AMERICANS MUST JUDGE FOR THEMSELVES WHETHER PROCEEDINGS INSPIRE CONFIDENCE.

Dr. Woffeiser, one of the greatest living authorities on the diagnosis of tubercular complaints, and the author of leading works on the subject, gave to The Toronto World tonight this statement regarding the Friedmann treatment.

"In the first place, all the doctors associated with Friedmann, including Prof. Schleich, are non-specialists, and therefore are wholly unqualified to give a scientific opinion regarding the results obtained here.

"Secondly, no report on Friedmann's patients mentions the appearance of any reaction caused by the poison invariably released by the killing of bacilli in the human body, in the absence of such reaction it must necessarily be feared that the Friedmann injection does not produce the effect claimed for it. This would agree with the report of the Washington board of health published here yesterday.

"Thirdly, the injection of cold-blooded tuberculous bacilli is not an original idea with Friedmann. Therefore it is improbable that he will obtain a German patent. Anyhow, it is greatly to be desired that no patent be granted, because such a patent would render it impossible to make proper scientific enquiries.

"Fourthly, the reports of cures or great progress shortly after the injections are gravely misleading. Tuberculosis bacilli can slumber in the human body a long time without having any outward appearance. Hence, only expert observation, after a long period, can determine whether the injection is dangerous or whether the supposed cure is genuine. Every tuberculous specialist can cite numbers of cases of sudden improvements by various methods, and these methods, if advertised like Friedmann's in the press, could have produced similar public excitement. But in many cases the improvements have not been maintained, or the patients have relapsed after a time.

"Canadians and Americans must judge for themselves whether Friedmann's proceedings there are calculated to inspire confidence."

STRONGER THAN EVER

Mr. White, the Minister of Finance, who is constantly bobbing up in the House of Commons with the jibe that "Reciprocity is dead" would do well to examine the results of the recent Provincial elections in Alberta. The factors which contributed to the great Liberal victory are reviewed in the current number of the Canadian

Courier, the independent Toronto weekly, edited by a strong Conservative. In the Courier's article the question is asked: "Why did the rural constituencies go almost solidly Liberal?" And the writer gives the explanation in part: "The first and biggest answer is in one word—Reciprocity. It is true that Reciprocity is a Dominion matter, and the Conservative press and platform were most careful to explain that it had no connection with present issues; but the farmers of Alberta looked back at Saskatchewan, and at the more recent bye-election in Macdonald, and they concluded that, if they elected a Conservative Government in Alberta, that fact would be quoted in Eastern Canada as an indication that the Western enthusiasm for wider markets was on the wane. And the farmer of the West today is more desperately in earnest in tariff matters than he was in 1911; because while then he hoped to gain something, now he fears he will lose even that which he already has."

"COMIN' THROUGH THE RYE."

(Kentville, N. S., Chronicle). Probably very few persons understand the expression "Comin' Through the Rye." There is in Scotland a small stream called the Rye. The girls formed it going to church, school and to market, and as the water was a foot or two deep they had to hold their skirts up. The

boys would meet them in mid-stream and kiss them without any difficulty as the girls couldn't drop their skirts to make any resistance. That's what the poet meant when he wrote "Comin' Through the Rye," but most people think he meant a field of rye.

Comfortable Collar Supports

Collar supports that are sewn into the neckband of a blouse often cause considerable discomfort, and are also troublesome to remove when the blouse has to be washed. To obviate this, try the following plan: Make little pockets of tape, half an inch deep and as wide as the supports, and then sew them on at the top and bottom of the neckband in the position required by the supports. The supports are then easily taken out, and one set will do for a number of blouses.

A rolling land of stiff clay makes the best soil for alfalfa. Gravel is fairly good if there is a good subsoil. Get a start in alfalfa, even if you sow it along with your grass seeds.
