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Will Retain World's Series

Chicago, Oct. 15.—B. B. Johnson, president of the American League, and members of the national baseball committee, favor the retention of world's series games each fall in their present form.

"While I recognize many of the necessary evils of the world's series, the one big point in its favor is that it arouses tremendous interest in every city and hamlet in the country," Johnson said Tuesday night. "This interest redounds to the benefit of baseball, and our efforts should be to strengthen baseball. The interleague series with 16 clubs competing would sustain local interest, but they would remove the great financial incentive for teams to win their league pennants."

The commission, President Johnson says, practically has agreed to the insertion in the uniform players' contracts of the major leagues for 1914 of a clause which will prohibit players from writing for newspapers.

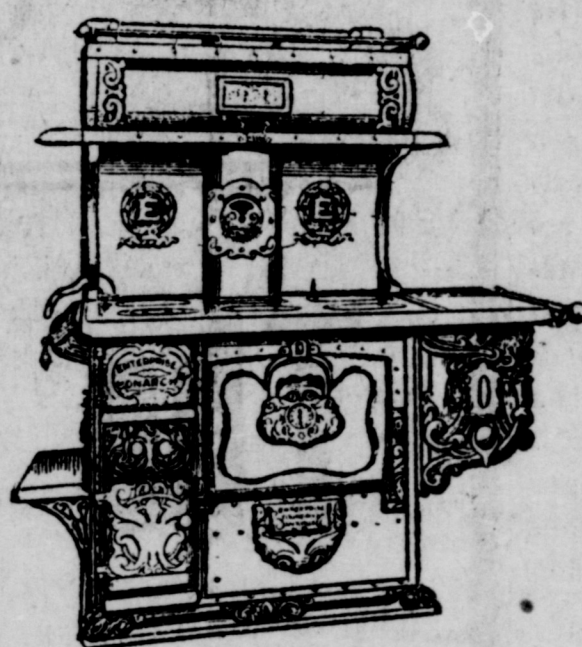
