Attention is drawn by the arrest of William McIntyre, charged with the theft of \$10,000 from the Bank of Nova Scotia, to the fact that young men employed by the banks in respon sible positions are frequently underpaid. The position of clerk in most of the banks is not a lucrative one, and while their respects for advancement are, in some cases, sufficient inducement for the young man to perform his work faithfully, the needs of the immediate present and the frequency with which he is called upon to handle large sums of money forms a great temptation. In some of the banks the tellers, who are required to receive and disburse cash in large amounts are required to work for as little as \$400 per year, while only one or two do they receive as much as \$1,000. In one of the local banks the tellers are paid \$1,000 to retain for themselves. In positions are as low as \$400 and probably do not average much over

Employes of banks and particularly tellers are engaged in highly responsible work and their opportunities to enrich themselves at the expense of their employers must necessarily be greater than those of the clerk in almost any other business employ. For this reason the penalty for theft from a bank by an employe under the criminal code has been set at fourteen years imprisonment withour reference to the amount of the theft. In the United States bank employes, and tellers in particular, receive salaries considerably larger than do those on this side of the border and the consequence is a greatly minimized temptation to
