Coun. Lindsay—The school board should consist of 9 members, two of them women—I move that Mrs. Bessie Comben be appointed a school trustee.

Coun. Dibblee—This is springing a motion—let this matter lay over—it is springing it a little too quickly.

Coun. Lindsay—I don't purpose to do council business in any back office, and I don't propose to consult Coun. Dibblee. The school board as constituted is not legal and has not been for years. I understand that Coun. Dibblee has always opposed the appointment of women on the school board.

Coun. Dibblee—Coun. Lindsay is a falsifier of the truth—I was never opposed to the appointment of a lady.

Coun. Lindsay—Your Worship—

Coun. Dibblee—I have the floor. I move an amendment that further action to appoint lady trustee be laid over till next Friday evening.

Coun. Balmmain—I take pleasure in seconding the motion—the matter is important and time has not been given for discussion.

Coun. Lindsay—One trustee says that he objects to women on board as the men will not be able to put their feet up on desks and smoke.

The amendment was lost. Original motion appointing Mrs. Comben a member of the school board carried.

Coun. Lindsay—I would move that the council chamber be placed at the disposal of the school board for their meetings, so that the public can attend. They are now held in an office—sometimes in a back office—where the public cannot be accommodated.

Coun. Dibblee—Meetings of school board are open to the public—the offices are convenient and comfortable—books and papers are there—meetings are sometimes held in the back office when in a hurry.

Coun. Jones—I second Coun. Lindsay's motion. The public should have more information—reporters will not go to this office to attend meetings. If books and papers are the reason we have a good vault in town hall and this is where they should be kept.

Coun. Dibblee—The school board is no star-chamber affair. I don't like these nasty insinuations. Everything is open and above board. Motion carried.

In answer to Coun. Burden the Mayor said the town time is legal and the change of C. P. R. time had no effect.

Coun. Balmmain—said that the town treasurer being very busy had not prepared the list of delinquent taxpayers but it would be ready Friday night.

Adjourned to Friday night 8.30.
