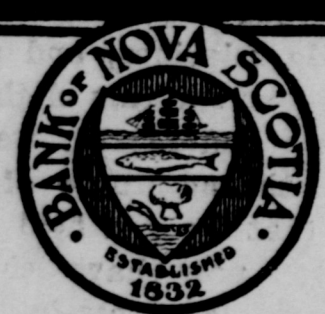

Captain John Murchie came from St. Stephen last week with an expert to look over the electric plant they have been talking of putting in at the Bel River Falls and at the dams around Benton.

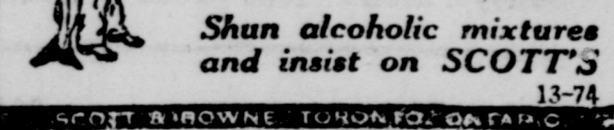
Mrs. Captain Howard got a message last evening that her husband's vessel was lost on the Hudson Bay route as he was homeward bound. He and the crew were saved.
