The amounts voted in this way for the various years since 1908 are particularly illuminating in view of a speech made by Mr. Borden as Leader of the Opposition in 1910, which he declared that the expenditures of the Laurier government were 518,354 of 1910-11? In 1912, the first half of the fiscal year was under Liberal, and the latter half under Tory government. Immediately there was an immense jump and the ordinary expenditures rose, to \$131,121,991. That this increase was caused by extravagance sioce October 1911, when the Borden government came to power is shown by the fact that most of this extra expenditure was copered by Appropriation Acts passed in the succeeding year to the extent of \$51,905,324 By 1913, when the Borden government had fairly struck its extravagant gait, the ordinary expenditures as shown by the Appropriation Acts had grown to \$147,003,005, while for the present year the provision for ordinary expenditures was no than \$174,453,151,
