Last year the Western farmers could not get enough of help, I could have hired fifty times before I got to my destination. Don't worry about the West friends, nothing can keep it back. I would like to see the East going ahead as fast.

Take Saskatoon and its only one of the many new cities in the West, only about nine years old, with a population of 35,000. The people in the West are not building cities for fun, they can see a glorious future ahead of them. I know of several parties who left here and went West to see what it was like. Did they come East to farm again? No they sold their farms here for what they could get and are now doing well in the West. For my part I would say to any young man who wants to see the Great Northwest for himself, it's worth your while even if you have to walk back.

The C. P. R. has obtained a lease of the Tobique Valley railway and will put on new rolling stock and begin the transportation of plaster. F. Moore & Son have contracted with the Tobique Plaster Company to build them a mill at Plaster Rock, with a capacity of 60 tons a day.

The 129 head of Ontario cattle exhibited at the World's Fair, won \$4,791 in prizes, and the horse prizes secured by the Province amounted to \$800.

There will be no election in town for Councillors, Tuesday; the old members, Messrs. D. Munro, John Fisher and W. S. Saunders, have no opposition.

A. E. Kuppey has his new factory, at Andover, well under way. It is 106 feet long and 40 feet wide, and is located on the bank of the river a little below the site of his burned factory.

Thomas McGrath, an old employee on the C. P. R., while stepping from a car at McAdam Junction, was struck by a shunting engine and knocked down, the car wheels crushing both legs just above the ankles. On Monday, the doctors attempted amputation, but the patient died under the operation.

Joseph Vanwart, more familiarly known as "Uncle Josey," one of the most aged of our citizens, and a man of unblemished reputation, dropped dead, while engaged in banking Mrs. Blake's house, on Wednesday afternoon. An inquest was not deemed necessary. Deceased was about 81 years of age.

Gideon Fields met with a serious accident on Tuesday. He was at work on a scaffolding and while in the act of throwing a bunch of shingles from where he stood to a scaffolding above him he lost his balance and fell to the ground below, breaking his collar bone and starting some of his ribs. Dr. Sprague was called.

Generous Bequest From the Late Charles E. Perks

Houlton, Sept. 17—The \$40,000 estate of Charles E. Perks of Houlton who died last month, will be divided among several Catholic institutions in Maine and New Brunswick. St. Dunstan's parish of Fredericton, N. B., will receive \$4,000; Fredericton hospital \$1,000; St. Vincent's De Paul of Fredericton, \$2,000; Misericordia Home, St. John, \$1,000; St. Mary's convent, Houlton, \$3,000; and the Ecclesiastical Students fund of the Catholic diocese of Portland, \$1,000.

The remainder will be divided between St. Mary's church of Houlton and St. Dunstan's parish of Fredericton, which are made residuary legatees.

fection forms a source of future infection.

The appearance of this disease has been well illustrated by the Farmers' Circular, No. 3, obtainable free of charge from the Publication Branch of the Department of Agriculture, at Ottawa. On discovery of my signs of potato canker, farmers should immediately notify the Dominion Botanist, Experimental Farm, Ottawa, of the outbreak, at the same time submitting specimen, when an inspector will be sent to assist and advise the farmer as regards the treatment to be given.

In accordance with the new regulations if diseased tubers are found no part of the crop can be sold. Before being used for any purpose all tubers whether sound or unsound, must

be boiled which destroys the disease. No potatoes from an infected field can be used for seed. The land upon which diseased potatoes have been raised is unfit for the production of potatoes for an indefinite number of years.

All potato growers should acquaint themselves with the publications furnished by the Department of Agriculture in reference to this disease. Potato canker, owing to its serious nature, has been made the subject of certain legislative measures under the Dominion Destructive Insect and Pest Act.

Any person who contravenes any provision of this act or any regulation made thereunder, shall be liable upon summary conviction, to a fine not exceeding one hundred dollars or to a term of imprisonment not exceeding six months, or to both fine and imprisonment.
