Fredericton, N. B., April 11.—The four clubs in the New Brunswick and Maine League have drawn for the players of Houlton and Woodstock Clubs of 1912, and result is as follows:

Hanley was traded to St. John by Calais and St. Stephen for Doherty, because the border team drew an over-supply of pitchers. In accordance with this drawing the players of last year's Houlton and Woodstock teams who wish to play again in this league must go to the clubs which have drawn them unless the clubs make some other arrangement.

"Ty" Cobb Some Pugilist

Spartanburg, S. C., April 8.—Renewing a quarrel which began here last Saturday, Ty Cobb, the well-known baseball player, and Rutledge Osborne, a member of the Wofford College team of this city, engaged in a rough and tumble fight in a Greenville hotel bedroom last night.

Osborne came off second best, but asserts to-night that three of Cobb's players held him while Ty kicked him. The friends of the "Georgia Peach" say that Osborne took offence at a fancied insult, refused to accept an apology, insisted on a fight, and that Cobb, in sheer self-defence, took Osborne to the room and gave him a spanking.

Chance Tells of Injury

"I never wrenched a tendon in my leg before and I can't understand now just how it happened," said Franche Chance. "My legs have been stronger than ever this spring and that is why I've been running so fast. Perhaps it was a soft spot in the ground near first base in which I stepped as I rounded the bag. Trainer Barrett tells me that I will be

all right again in a day or two. I'll play against Washington on Thursday, if I have to use a crutch.

"Derrick's injury was more serious. It could not be avoided, and we will miss him. He was just beginning to show real skill. Young, however, is a fine fielder, and he will play shortstop until Derrick gets back.

Chance and McGraw Cut Strings

New York, April 10.—Major league baseball teams here have already begun cutting down their strings in preparation for compliance with the twenty-five player limit rule. Manager Frank Chance, of the New York Americans, has disposed of pitcher "Paddy" Green to the Pittsburgh Nationals, and announces that he has let five more players go. He has released shortstop Douglas Harrison to Chattanooga of the Southern League, third baseman John Priest to Rochester, of the International League, pitcher George Davis to Jersey City, of the International League, shortstop Finley to Troy, and Pitcher Gaiser to Albany, of the New York State League.

Manager McGraw, of the New York Nationals, announces the release of Pitcher Lou Bader to the Dallas team of the Texas League.

Cardinals Want Thorpe

ST. LOUIS, Mo., April 8.—"Jim" Thorpe, Indian athlete, who signed with the New York Giants, and joined them to-day at Washington, may become a Cardinal. All that is needed for the Carlisle man to join the local National League club is for John J. McGraw to accept an offer made by Miller Huggins. It is believed here that waivers have been asked on Thorpe, because Tuesday morning Huggins sent the following telegram to McGraw:

"Will take Thorpe off your hands. What is his salary?"

Huggins would not say whether waivers had been asked or whether Thorpe had been offered to the Cardinals. He declared that he was eager to get the Indian, and that he would outbid any National League manager.

Smallpox Scare in Baseball Team

Chicago, Ill., April 10.—Members of the Chicago National league club were disturbed today when told that smallpox had broken out among the Minneapolis players. The latter used the visitors' dressing rooms at the local clubhouse here Tuesday when they played an exhibition game, and while it is said Comstock was not with the Minneapolis club then, Killmer was. No word of the outbreak of the disease was sent to President Murphy by the Minneapolis officials, but it was said he would take measures to protect his players and those of the visiting clubs from contagion.

Body—Five passenger touring type, flush sides, shroud on front.

Frame—Pressed steel, special construction, extra strong; three and one-half inch drop.

Springs—Front, semi-elliptic; rear, three-quarter elliptic, with scroll ends.

Front Axle—Drop forged "I" beam with heat treated drop forged yokes, tie rod ends and steering spindles. Front wheels fitted with large cup and cone ball bearings.

Rear Axle—Heavy construction, semi-floating type; special high carbon-steel axle shaft, running on Hyatt alloy steel roller bearings, 12-inch brake drive.

Wheels—Wood, artillery type; Universal rims; large hub flanges.

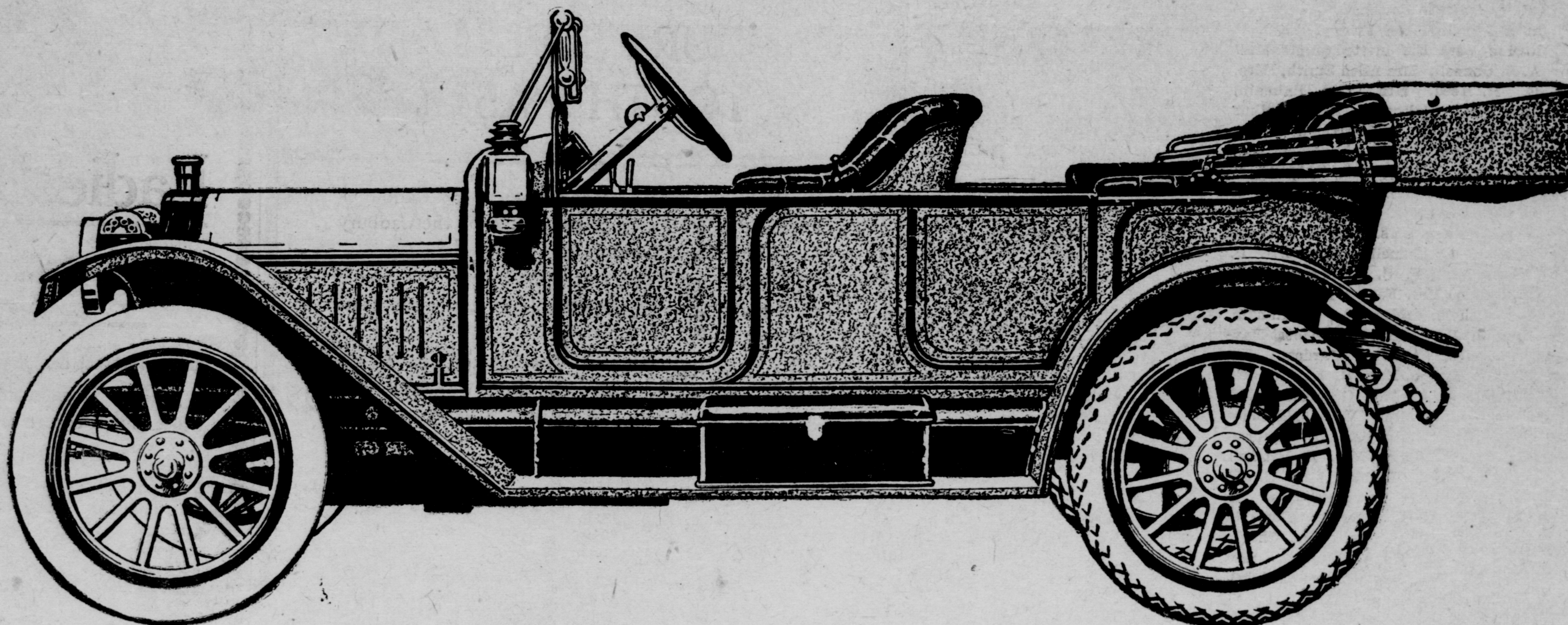
