## ROGERS IS THE MASTER

(Toronto Globe).

Ottawa, April 10—The real master-ship of Canada's Government was declared from the housetops on Wednesday. What was deliberately designed by the Government caucus to be a humiliation to Sir Wilfrid Laurier proved to the world the deep degradation of Premier Borden. With a suddenness swift as Lucifer from heaven Mr. Borden was hurled from the high pedestal of his own loud protestations of a statesman's honor down into the common rock of knavish political trickstering. The man who did it was his own lieutenant, whom he dare not trust, but whom he has not the power to resist.

Robert Rogers, not Robert Borden, is master of Canada's Government.

GLARING BETRAYAL OF HONOR.

Premier Borden has no more power of leadership to-day than when in Opposition he abdicated to a small group of conspirators who sought his political life. Now, as then, he affects kid-gloved methods, but countenances the brutalities of a brigand. His defenders tell me he would like to be a gentleman in politics. I used to believe that without question, but when he played a dishonorable game with a political gamester like Rogers he showed himself the more discredited of the two. The one has to his credit that he professes neither honor nor decency; the other publicly professes all the virtues, but when tested is either the weak tool or the corrupted partner of his ally. There is no use mincing words. What men in Halifax who knew him advised me years ago has been justified to the last ugly letter. I refused then to believe it; since Wednesday all denial is empty mockery. Out of his own mouth came the soft promises of fair play, but within ten minutes his voice joined with those who planned to howl down Sir Wilfrid Laurier into humiliation. For him to have cried "Sit down! sit down!" as the Press Gallery men report him doing, was, in the light of Laurier's years of most chivalrous treatment, "in-gratitude more base than traitor's wounds," baser by far than the hoodlum sneers of Rogers' brawling brood. No decent citizen who knows the facts would dispute the justness of Carvell's stern and scorching denunciation of the Premier's glaring betrayal of the common honor of a gentleman.

CANADA IS DEFAMED

No one will blame Liberals in Parliament for their indignation. Not to be indignant at the dishonor done to the Premiership of Canada by its present holder is to confess oneself heedless of Canada's most sacred political trust. Had the \$35,000,000 to be gifted to the British Admiralty for Imperial defence been dumped in the Chaudiere the loss would have been a trifle compared to this defamation of Canada's honor before the world.

The abiding evil of the Premier's surrender is that the master who compelled this abasement can, with the new instrument of closure, gag every graft investigation, even though millions were siphoned from the naval contribution. He can jam through any gerrymander bill or tariff iniquity, and serve the unjust demands of any hierarchy, ecclesiastical or commercial, to the irreparable damage of Canada.

AN IMPERIAL TRAGEDY

The strong voice of Labor was heard when Mr. Verville declared himself with vehemence in his vote against gagging freedom of speech in Parliament. There is not one in a hundred of the people, industrial, political or moral, that is not threatened. Mr. Borden's assurances and pledges quite plainly are not worth the breath he spends in speaking them. His master, when mastership counts, will always be the man to whom on Wednesday he made such compromising obeisance. Never again need he talk of freedom or justice or honor; the pity of it is that in his degradation the people of Canada must suffer. And when it is part of an alleged Imperial program it becomes, as one British journal says, "an Imperial tragedy."
