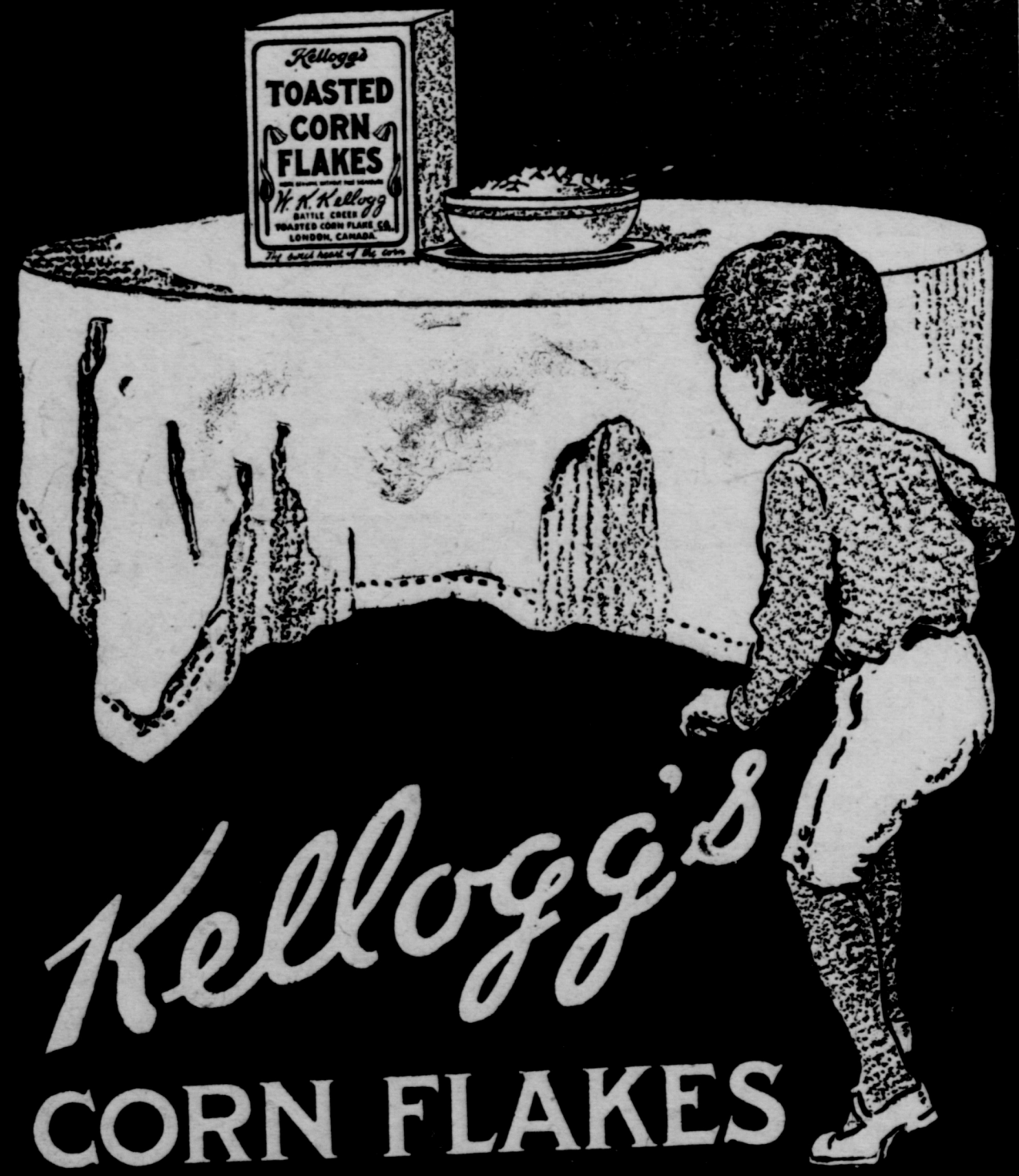

HARD BLOW TO FOX COMPANY

Twelve Litters Lost at One Time
—Nothing Known Except
That the Pups Have

Charlottetown, April 24.—There was a big sensation in fox circles today when it became known that the Chas. Dalton Company lost twelve litters within a short time. As the litters average about four each, the total loss is about \$300,000, the worst individual loss in the history of the industry in this province.

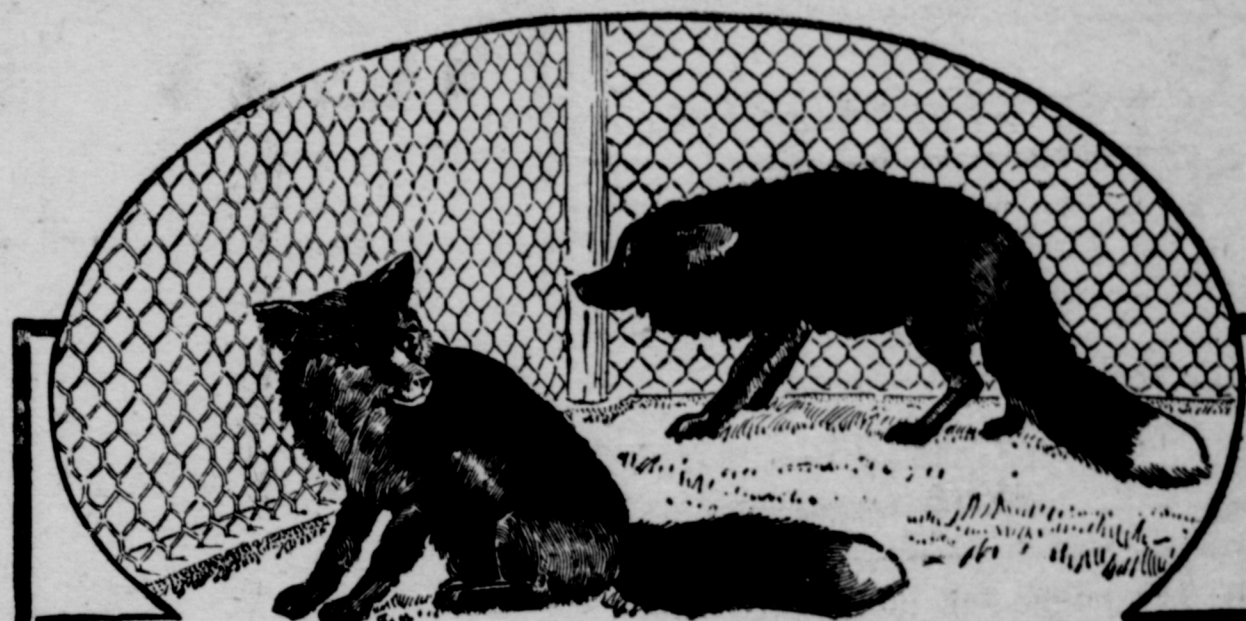

A New Potato

The busy little bee is responsible for a new variety of Island Empire potato, according to Harvey K. Bradley, a rancher, in the Klamath District. The new tuber has been dubbed the "Bradley" potato, in view of the fact that it was developed on his farm. Mr. Bradley has been coaching this newest spud along for four years and believes that he has the distinct variety perfected. "The potato is really a cross between the 'Burbank' and 'Million Dollar' varieties," said Mr. Bradley recently. "Its origin was accidental. The credit must go to the bees, which carried the pollen from the blossom of one and deposited it in the blossom of the other. The new potato is a good yielder, especially in heavy soil, and each one weighs from eight to twelve ounces. They are great keepers and will last until June of the next year. I dug last year from ten to sixteen in a hill and they make a mealy baked potato and boil well. I can plant them in May and dig them before the ground freezes."—Spokane, Wash., Review.

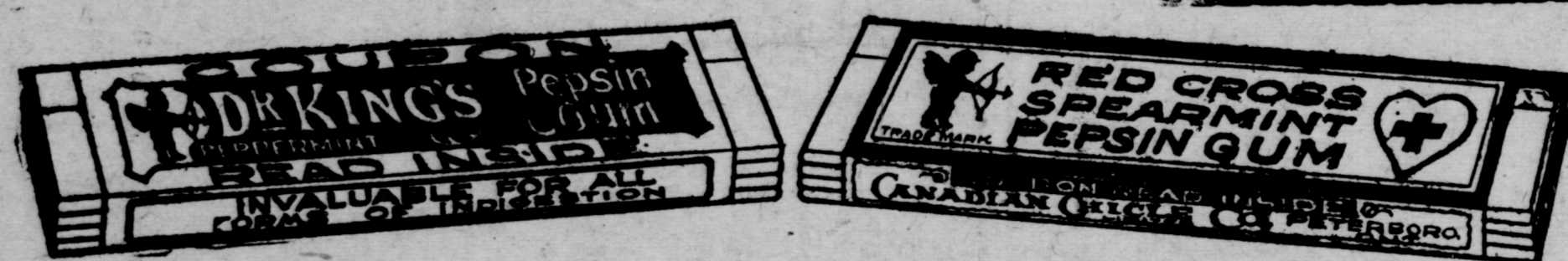
